The highest rate paid was 8 per cent., which seems almost fabulous, when one contrasts the times, as they now are, with the period which followed the suspension of the Bank of Pennsylvania, in '57. A few days only was gold as high as it now is, and it soon sunk to 1 per cent, continuing to fall steadily until the banks resumed. True, considerable quantities of home securities are being shipped back to us for realization, and London bankers require the hard cash, or good exchange; and as we have no goods or products to send them, gold necessatily becomes the me-diam of exchange. Provided we can stand the drain until foreign capitalists are satisfied that we can buy and pay for our own paper, their anxiety must work to our

advantage.

The passage of the legal tender bill by the House had an exciting effect on the builton market, and many begin to look for a great inflation in prices. The feeling is but a temporary one, and the acknowledged ability of the American reople to adapt themselves to the circumstances which surround them will undoubtedly lead them, after a day or two's reflection, to meet the curreacy question bravely.
