Col. CHARLES ELLET, Jr., late Commander of the United States Ram Fleet, on the Mississippi river, is no United States Ram Fleet, on the Mississippi river, is no more.

A native of Pennsylvania, he was reared in and near this city. In his early youth he visited Europe, and tavelled over much of it on foot, devoting his tims to the study of bridge architecture and the kindred branches of civil engineering, in which he subsequently became most righly distinguished.

On the breaking out of the present rebellion he urged upon the Government the construction of steam front claims for the defence of our Western rivers, and was commissioned by the President to organize and command a fleet of such versels. With his un iring energy he soon completed his fleet, organized his crews, and, in command of it, he decembed the Mississippi river, and took a most active and decisive part in the naval action with the rebel fleet before Memphis.

In this battle the value of steam rams for naval warfare was again illustrated in the most conspicuous manner, but it was at the expense of the life of their distinguished Commander, who, severely wounded in the action, was taken to Cairo, where he yielded his life on the 21st instant. Victory crowned his efforts, the nation rejoices in the success of his brilliant genius, but Pennsylvania laments the lose of mother of her most gifted sons. His remains having been brought here for interment, it is ordered.
