New York, June 28, 1862. Last week, several hundred sick and wounded solders, belonging to Penus) Ivania, arrived in this city, on their home-return from the seat of war. A majority of those men bave a short furlough, and have manifestel not a little impatience at the long delay they have been compeled to make at the receiving depots in this city. The New York, the New England, and the Western men are sent home immediately after their arrival here, but the brave boys from the Keystone State are detained from three to five days, exhausting the precious time of their furlough—disappoining the friends who wait anxiously to receive them, and occupying the places needed for fresh arrivals.

The Dan'el Webster, the S R. Spaulding, the Commodore, and the Erics on reached this port last week, each having a large number of Pennsylvanians on board-but no agent, no committee man, no Pennsylvania man to look after them. Agents of other States directed them to the Park Hospital and the New England Booms, where they have been well cared for; but they were anxious to visit their homes, and complain because they are kept here day after day, while other men from other States are sent directly to their friends.
On Friday, J. H. McGuigan, who came here on the Spaniding, died at the hospital, and because there is no proper record kept here, his poor old father, a laborer in biladelphia, was three days in search of him. THE CITY.

Arrival of the Steamers State of Maine and Whilldin-More Sick and Wounded. On Saturday morning the steamer State of Maine arrived from White House Point, Virginia, which place she left on Thursday afternoon. She had five hundred and ninety-two sick soldiers on board from General Mc Clellan's army. The great majority were suffering from diar hoa, and the fevers and ailments incident to camp life. Of the whole number but six were wounded. One man, named Thomas Woodruff, of Co D, 49th Pennsylvania, died on the passage, and was buried at Fortress The fact of the arrival of the boat was not generally

known, but the news spread rapidly, and in a very short space of time a considerable crowd had collected on the Chief Ruggles, with a squad of police, was promptly on the ground, and did much to keep the crowd in order. A rope was stretched across the wharf, and none but those having actual business with the sick were allowed to have access to the vessels, thus giving the most ample room for the transportation of the sufferers to more comfortable

A large number of ladies were in attendance with re-freshments for the rick defenders of the country. Nearly all of them had fruit and ice water, which they distributed in all directions. One enthusiastic lady purchased tne entire stock in baste of a cake vender, and placed it before the soldiers, who sat on the wharf waiting for a conveyance to the hospitals. Some of them brought large umbrellas, thus affording a grateful shelter to the sick men from the rays of the sun.

The patients were then distributed among the various army hospitals, the new hospital at Eighth and Market to the hospital did so, others were taken in ambulances

coming in for a large share. All who were able to walk while those who were so ill that they could neither sit nor stand were carried on stretchers. DARING ROBBERY-A FIRE-PROOF DARING ROBBERY—A. I'IRE-FROOF BLASTED WITH POWDER.—Some time during Friday evening the store of Mr. John N. Shriver, wholessle fish desler, No. 32 North Wharves, was entered by thieves. The desks in the counting-house were ransacked, but nothing was obtained there except some postage stamps. The valuables were all in a small tire-proof safe. This safe was on rollers, and was taken out into the store and run about half way up to Water street. There it was turned upon the side, with the door uppermost. The keyhole was filted with gunpowder, and the safe was thus blown open. most. The rascals seem to have taken every precaution to provent their operations from being observed outside, and also to deaden the sound of the explosion, that the noise might not attract attention. The spat where the first profession was operated upon was approved.

The spot where the fire-proof was operated upon was a sort of recess, surrounded by kegs of fish pilled up almost to the ceiling, a lot of hams were laid along the floor behind the doors on Delaware avenue, and the transom was closed up by some bagging, so that the light used by the follows might not be seen by any person passing. In the same manner were the gratings, &c., cn Water street fixed.

The whole inside of the door of the fire-proof was blown off, and the works of the lock so deranged that it could easily be opened. The safe contained about \$300 in ca h. \$500 in paper, check book, &c., all of which were carried off by the thieves.

From the appearance of the store, the rascals are believed to have come in through the store of Messers. Craige & Co., who occupy the second story of the premises. The doors and windows of Mr. Shriver's store were all fastened, and bore no marks of attempt having been made to force them. One of the batches at the Water-streat end of the store was found open, and beneath it fish kegs were arranged in such a manner as to form a series of steps. In Oraige & Co.'s store, close by the hatchway was found the check book of Mr. Shriver, and also a small tin box, which was used for putting away gold. Seventeen cents had been left in the latter. The thieves also left behind them a jimmy, a pair of stocklögs, and a paper of gunpowder. also left behind them a jimmy, a pair of stockings, and a paper of guppowder.

The counting house of Craige & Oo. was also ransacked, but the thieves obtained only a few postage stamps and a pipe. They went out leaving one of the doors op in. This robbery was a most daring one, and was conducted so quiolly that neither the private watchman in the neighborhord nor the policemen on the beat knew anything about the affair.
