We were not favored with any bullets from rebel guns on our way down the James river, but had prepared ourselves in "anticipation of such favors. Arriving at Fortress Mon-roe at 5 P. M. on Tuesday. 15th inst., wo were detained a little taking in a supply of bread for the soldiers, and "thorm arising, delayed us till next merning, when we left for New Jork at 5 A.M. "During, our size at Harrison's Landing we had an Opportunity of visiting the camps, and several of our party were fortunate enough to arrive at McClellan's headquarkers on Sunday moring, in time to be present at the service. The commissary of the Webster was fro-quently called upon to distribute oranges and from our sup-bies for sick coldiers in camp and at the hospitals, and the recipients were all very thankful to the Sanitary Commission for such artention. angements. MORE STARTLING NEWS FROM FORT DELAWARE-TWO HUNDRED BEBEL PRISON-ERS REPORTED TO HAVE ESCAPED .-- A telegraphic despatch appeared in yesterday's Washington Republican, transmitted from Wilmington, Del., of

Mejulo Joan, transmitted from Wilmington, Del., of which the following is a copy: WILMINGTON, July 10.—Messers. Editors: More than two hundred rebel prisoners effected their e-cape last inght from Nort Delaware, and made tracks for Dixie. Upon the arrival of the mail train at Perryville, this forencoe, five of them were f. und on heard, and were ar-reated and placed under guard. It is not known as yet how they managed to pass the guards of the fort. Commenting upon the above, the Republican says :

Commenting upon the above, the *Bepublican* says: "Up to the time of this escape, there were 3.181 rebal prisoners confined at Fort Delaware, and about 3.000 more expect.d at the end of naxt wesk. The steamer Baltic arrived at the fort on Saturday 18st, having on board 1,200 prisoners, who were transferred from Go-vernor's Island, New York, to Fort Delawary. They comprise the whole number quartered at Governors Island. The prisoners, with the exception of the rebel officers, who are about one hundred in number, and who have quarters inside the fort, occupy barracks on the upper and of the island. These barracks are commanded y heavy casemate guns in the fort, and also by shotte

field-nicces "The barracks crected are capable of accommodating "The barracks crected are capable of accommodating 2,000 men. Other barracks are in course of crection, intended to accommodate 5,000 more. The guard con-sists of about 250 men, comprising portions of three batte-ries. A guard patrols the island at all hours, to prevent any attempt at secape; but the circumstance that *two hundred* have escaped establishes the fact that 250 men are not enough to guard *three thousand* reckless and determined rebels, who have nothing to do but organize plans for escape." for escape. If it is true that an excursion party, chiefly composed of Nowcasile Seccessionists, has been allowed to visit the fort, it is very easy to see how the escape may have been contrived. If the fort is so cary of ac-cess to visitors, and to spies in the guise of excursionists, it is not a safe place to confine ten or twelve hundred prisoners. The Bulletin justly says: The commanding officer ought to forbid all visitors, except such as have official business, or, such as have permits from the higher authorities, military or civil. Such is the system adopted at Fort Infayette and Fort Warren, where escape is almost impossible. It is much more important that it should prevail at Fort Delaware, where escape is not so difficult, while in addition there are traitors on shore ready to help the fugitives and spead them on their way to Dixie. If the garcinson in the fort is insufficient to guard it properly, then it ought to be incurved. It is scandalous that any man should have heen allowed to escape from it, and there ought to be an investigation into the matter to see who is to blame.
