

Quite likely they did, and where they will continue to go until the matter is thoroughly attended to. At Beaufort, North Carolina, the patients in the hospital complained of having but little to eat. At first it was set down that some grumbler was endeavoring to create mischief. But the complaints came to Newbern, faster and faster. A commissioner slipped down quietly one day and found that they complained for good cause—those that had money could make out, but those that were "broke" were in danger of wanting something to eat.
