### THE MONEY MARKET.

The quantity of bullion sold at the Board of Brokers in New York yesterday figured up to nearly a million of dollars. This is independent of the sales made on Wall sirent, and goes to prove that from some cause or other ators are compelled to sell out. Foreign intervention was the goad they used upon the market, but now that the spur is broken, the overstrained animal falters, and finally has dropped. The extent of the fears aused by their designing, mercenary motives are only to be reckoned by the numberless long faces to be seen on every hand a short time ago. Specie at 20 per cent. premium! and people whispered it with white lips, as hough fearing a dreadful blow from some huge mon whose form, not yet visible, was already dimly outline forth on the black clouds of our country's danger. The uncertainty in regard to the future, with specie at this figure, seemed but a veil-ready at any moment to be lifted-covering the dread features of universal ruln, But, happily, this was not the feeling in our larger monetary circles. They knew their power; they fe that the Soip of State must be sustained : that without a vernment they would be without ability to protect their means: that to save themselves they must save their Government; and to day the Government atter the manner in which they went manfully to work and upheld, if they have not saved, her. Shorter-sighted m would have thought only of themselves ; nothing of the Republic. Had our money rulers done so where would be the credit of the United States at the present moment, and at what rate would her securities be selling, payable in specie? The decline in gold continued to-day, and the figure receded to 113, but rallied towards the close up to 116. This is a decline of 1 from yesterday's figure. The market was feveri in and fluctuating, closing rather Old demands fell during the day to 5%, but recovered to 6. Large amounts were offered and refused at 6% of. H Corresponding with the good feeling created by the de-

cline in gold, stocks exhibited a decided buoyancy, and prices of almost everything on the list advanced. United States securities were in demand; the sizes of 1881 opened at 90%, and sold at the Second Board at 100, being a total advance of 1% on the best figure of vester day; the seven-thirties, blank, advanced X, and continuel firm: one-year certificates sold at 98%; Pennsylvania 5s advanced % ; the coupons sold up to 93, an advance of %; City 6s were very lively.
