ENROLLING THOSE SUBJECT TO MILI-ENROLLING THOSE NUBJECT TO MILITARY DUTY —The assessors in the various wards are now busily engaged in ceredling the names of all persons subject to perform military duty, under an act of Assembly passed in 1855. There is a mieraken notion among many persons called upon, that the enrolment of their names is preparatory to a draft by the Government Such is not the fact, theugh if a craft should become necessary, the present eurolment would greatly assist the authorities employed to do the work. The present work of the assessors is merely to carry out the law which requires a return every year of those subject to military duty, so that a militia tax could be collected from those who were not cyrolled in volunteer companies. The monay thus raised was to assist in keeping up uniformed volunteer companies, and to pay the assessors for their labor in making the eurolement. In consequence of the non-collection of this military tax, except in a few cases, the assessors neglected to perform the labor, for several years past, hence the order from Harrisburg to have the work completed as soon as possible, the time of the roturn having long since passed.

TAVERN LICENSES .- The tavern li-TAVERN LICENSES.—The tavern licenses granted this year, within the limits of this city, number about twenty-four hundred, less by several hundred than the number taken out last year. The average of the five previous years is three thousand. It is believed that a large number are doing business without a license, which may be done, if the constables do not perform the duty devolving upon them. They are required to enter every house, and see whether the certificate of license is hanging in the bar-room or not, and to r-port all houses to the Court of Quarter Sessions, in which the certificate is not found. The fear of incurring the displeasure of the tavern krepers has induced some of the constables to withhold their report until they were cited to appear before the court, and compelled to make it under a fear of being heavily fined.

Mo—and report for such duty, compatible with their parole, as may be assigned to them by patible with their parole as may be assigned to them by the officers in command of said comman And all whether officers or soldiers, who fail to comply with this order, within the space of time necessary for them to do so, within the space of time necessary for them to do so, will be accounted descriers, and dealt with accordingly. The attention of all commanding, mu-tering, and recruiting officers is particularly directed to this order, and they are required to use their utmost escritions, not only to give it the widest circulation in their neighborhoods, but to see that it is fathefully earlied out. And their hacellencies, the Covernors of the several States, are respectfully solicited to lend their efforts to the same end.

IV. The transportation necessary to a compliance with this order can, on application, be produced from the Governors of the sewant states, or from the United States nustering or collinanding officers in the various cities within them.
