From the Omaha Nebraskian, July 24.] It is currently reported in this city that the first Mormon trains from Sult Lake City this season, were stopped at Fort Laramie by the military authorities there, in pursuance of an order from the Government. FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL. THE MONEY MARKET.

PHILADELPHIA, August 4, 1862. Money continues abundant. The quotations for call oans are 4.05 per cent.; for first-class mercantile paper from 4 to 6. One year certificates of indebtedness were in demand at 98% 2098%. Gold was less active to-day. and the rate was steady. Buyers were rather shy at anything above 114%, although that figure was freely paid in the morning; toward afternoon 114 was the best offered, at which rate the market closed. The Sub-Treasury, at New York, received last week nearly half a million on deposit, on call after ten days, at 4 per cent. The Herald

"Financiers are beginning to question the wisdom of the Government deposit system. It is said that, by allowing 4 per cent for deposits on call, Mr. Chase is standing in his own light, and impeding the natural advance of his 6 per cent. stock. So long as capitalists can get 4 per cent en call, the temptation to give par for a 6 per cent. stock is slight. It is argued that if the rate allowed by Government for deposits was reduced to 2% 03 per cent, the public would naturally invest their money in the funded securities of the United States, and hence that the five twenty honds would soon be placed at a price which funded securities of the United States, and hence that the five-twenty bonds would soon be placed at a price which would induce active conversions of currency. We cannot help thinking the deposit system has achieved its purpose and fulfalled its object. At a very serious crisis in our financial history it supplied the Government with funds when no other resource was available. Whether it prosents any present advantages which can counterbalance its obvieus demerits is at least an open question. Borrowing on call is always a dangerous expecient. It is a simple and tempting financial method; but every Wallstreet operator knows that demand loans are invariably called in just at the moment when it is most inconvenient called in just at the moment when it is most inconvenient to pay them. We are inclined to think that a steady adherence to the convertible paper-money system will work more satisfactorily for the Government, and, in the main, more beneficially to the public, than any other plan which here here, can be desired."
