The public is not aware of the intricacy and difficulty of the duties involved in this work, neither does it know where to attribute the credit. of the arrangements which carry the business on so smoothly; all that it feels is that it is not bothered by any jarring in the details themselves or between the officials who prepare and plan them In our reportorial capacity, we have no right to intrude upon the personal privacy of these faithful executive officers; yet we feel that we shall be wanting in fairness to our thousands of readers if we delay any further to make distinct mention of the parties whose exertions have secured such admirable results. If it seem to them an unwarrantable liberty, we shall regret it; but plead the necessity that is laid upon us of keeping the public advised concerning its faithful as well as its negli-First, then, to the medical director, Dr. King, let us return the thanks of the city. It is his organizing power that keeps a dozen hospitals, with all the multiplicity of their troublesome detail, in so perfect order that Philadelphia stands, by prescription, at the head of the cities that have labored for he sanatory welfare of our soldiers. We presented yesterday, a brief sketch of Dr. King's professional career; but he is writing his truest history here and now, and the gratitude of a city will be a more honorable record than the columns of any paper." Secondly, to Dr. King's chief assistant, Mr. Moses, is due the method and the energy that conduct, without collision or hesitation, the particulars of such great works as the quiet but rapid landing of fourteen hundred sick and suffering men. Mr. Moses parades no shoulder-straps or splendor of uniform, but neither does he display the arrogance, weakness, and stopidity that too often characterize dandy officials. Unassuming, he still makes his influence everywhere felt. Present seemingly at all points and at all times, he manages to arrange every item as if his whole attention were given to that alone. He never appears wearled, and most certainly is never cross. While he is bound to adopt an rigidly enforce certain rules to regulate his department, he has not a particle of that lumbering stolidity that clings to the letter of the law and thereby often destroys its spirit. Affable to outsiders, he is yet a quick, practical, business man; and though his little personal kindnesses are unremitting to those placed in his charge, he does not suffer his feelings to run away with his judgment or interfere with the exact discharge of his professional responsibilities. The public of Philadelphia, as well as the thousands of soldiers cared for in our midst, owe more to Dr. King and to Mr. Moses than they imagine. PHILADELPHIA BOARD OF TRADE.
