The Kennebec, as she passed up the Delaware river, caused large crowds to follow her and gather at Vine-street wharf, where many presumed she would land her patients. Instead of this she passed up to Kensington and havied in at Palmer-atreet wharf, from where about 200 of her patients were conveyed to the German hospital. .
