In every case, therefore, where the soldier leaves a wife and children or either, the fact will be noted, and the number and sexes of his children entered on the Roll, together with the range of their ages.

It a soldier dies, or is wounded in the service, or is honorably or otherwise discharged, the fact, as it may hereafter appear from the official report, will be entered on the Rolls opposite his name.

The Folls are intended to present a faithful record of the career of every volunteer from Pennsylvania during his term of service; and it is hoped that regimental and line officers will facilitate the object, and that the name of no man who serves his country in the present war will be omitted from its history. be omitted from its history.
