THE CITY. THE RECENT ARRIVAL OF SICK AND WOUNDED SOLDIERS-LIST OF THE NAMES .-We publish to-day a list of sick and wounded soldiers of Pennsylvania and New Jersey regiments, who arrived in this city during Wednesday and early yesterday morning. The total number that arrived is between two and three thousand, which were distributed among the various military hospitals and other buildings temperarily secured military hospitals and other buildings temperarily secured for that purpose. The capacities of the hospitals were by no means sufficient to accommodate all; but this state of "affairs did not last long, as the pastors of three churches in the vicinity of the Baltimore depot premptly tendered the use of their buildings, and the offar was accepted. These churches were the Broad-street Methodist, Bev. Mr. Cooper, at Broad and Uatharine streets; St. Theresa's Boman Catholic, Bev. Father Lane, also at Broad and Catharine streets, and the Presbyterian church, Bev. Dr. Watt, it Broad and Fitzwater streets. Several hundred of the men were quartered both in the basement and body of the churches. The house of the Franklin Hose Company was also used for the same purpose. The ladies in the neighborhood turned out en masse, and bestowed the utmost care and attention upon the sick soldiers. Refreshments, bardages, &c., were supplied in abundance. The members of the Philadelphia Engine Company had The members of the Philadelphia Engine Company and a large combibus, and were actively engaged all day and night in conveying provisions, &c., from the Refreshment Salcons to the soldiers. They also conveyed the tadies to the depot and back again to the salcons, concluding their labors about four o'cluck yesterday morning. Some of the soldiers were wounded in the recent battles under General Pope, but most of their injuries were slight. It will be impossible to procure a complete list of all those will be impossible to procure a complete list of, all those who were brought on until the surgeous in charge make their report, which in a number of cases has not yet been done. This could not be avoided, as no list was even furmished when the patients took their depurture from Washington and violative for this city, and the name of each individual had to be registered as he was admitted into the hospital. The average annual cost of supplying each child is less than forty dollars, and it is bolieved that in no institution in this country, or abroad, are children more happy and contented, or cared for more tenderly and less expensively than at the Northern Home. The building, at Brown and Twenty-third streets, is always a model of cleanliness and neatness; and those in charge of it are uniformly civil. Pais being an unendowed institution, the benevolent are invited to perpetuate the useful disposition of their estates by making bequests to this and similar truly charitable associations. A legacy of five hundred dollars, by Mrs. Mary Blame, is acknowledged in the report. The present need of funds for its emport is necessarily increased by the large number of soldiers' children that have been there furnished with a home during the absence of their fathers at the seat of war.
