THE SHERIFF CONTESTED-ELECTION CARE.—The argument in the contested-election case of Thempson vs Ewing was resumed yesterday morning. Mr. F. O. Breweter, in continuation of his argument nenced the day previous, called the attention of the count to the fact that, in reference to the answer of the respondent, no evidence at all had been given under one hundred and seven specifications. He also adverted to the equally patent fact, that in support of certain specifications 'alleging the reception of illegal votes " to the number of nine and upwards," one witness only had been called, and in many similar instances the witnesses did not testify that they voted for Mr. Thompson, and there was no proof of their disqualification to vote. Mr. Brewster's argument, on the day previous, was generally confined to a supervision of the evidence offeror attempted to be offered, in support of the first thirty-seven specifications contained in the respondent's answer. He referred, in opening, to the decision deliver-ed by Mr Justice Woodward, of the Supreme Court, in the case of a contested election for District Attorney of Inverne county, and held that no distinction could be of the State and those cast at Easton.

He continued: We stand, therefore, upon the face of our return, thus corrected by a decision of our Supreme-Court, with a majority of 146 votes for Mr. Thempson; and the subject for discussion now is, how is that certificate to be met—how is that majority to be overcome?
Our friends on the other side have given us, inclusive of fractions. 200 aparticles in a Vous hours have sticked. fractions, 200 specifications. Your honors have stricken out twenty-nine of them. Our friends have seen fit to offer evidence under sixty-four, but they have actually omitted to offer any evidence under 107 of those which they regarded as material to the proof of their case. Under the first specification there has been no proof offered t. all. Under the second, it was charged that Mr. hompson had received twenty-two votes to which he was not entitled, while all the evidence showed that he was entitled to that number. No naper among those pro was entitled to that number. No paper among those produced gave him e less number. I have, therefore, marked No. 2 "disproyed."

From a suma ing up and silting of the evidence, it was apparent that no proof had been offered to sustain the third, fourth, and fifth specifications. The sixth charged that Robert Ewing "is falsely returned as having 144 votes, when he was in fact entitled to 145 votes." The votes, when he was in fact entitled to 145 votes." The tally papers gave Mr. Ewing 146, the hourly return 146, while the tetal, as per general return, was 144. This was the evidence in support of that specification. Under specification of \$\chi_2\$, it was charged that, in the Fourth precinct of the Twelth ward, Robert Ewing received three votes which were taken and counted in the general return for John Thompson. Two witnesses were examined, but no proof was adduced is support of the charge. The seventh specification, charging that in the Seventh precinct of the Thirteenth ward Mr. Ewing "is falsely returned as receiving 109 votes, whereas in reality he received 114," was not proved—four papers giving Mr. Ewing 109 votes, while but one paper gave him 114 The specification was not proved, and the eight and a half and ninth were not attempted to be proven. The tenth ninth were not attempted to be proven. The tenth specification, charging that Mr. Ewing received 158 votes in the Second division of the Nineteenth ward, while only 157 were credited to him, was not proved. The hourly paper gave Mr. Thompson 109, Mr. Ewing 157; the general return, Thompson 109, Ewing 147. No tally papers were produced, and, consequently, the specification stood before the court upon paper against Of the remaining specifications, up to the thirty seventh, a great majority of them were not proven, while a few would be left to the determination of the court At half past two o'clock yesterday the court adjourned.

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT ON THE BALTI-MORE BAILBOAD - LOSS OF LIFE. Yesterday morning, about one o'clock, a collision occurred on the Philadelphia. Willimpigon, and Baltimore Baltroad, about half past three o'clock, which was the cause of a terrible accident whereby a number of soldiers were killed and some very dangerously wounded. A short time before one o'clock, resterday morning, a through freight train for Baltimore left the depot at Broad and Washington streets, and when a short distance blow Gray's Ferry Bridge the train became disconnected, and the road was, as a matter of course, temporarily ob structed by the cars. A special train with troops was following close behind, and, when the accident occurred a man was sent back, with a lantern, to warn the special train; Dut in consequence of the heavy fog which then existed, the engineer of the train containing the troops did not see the signal until too late to prevent the collision. He immediately reversed the engine, but the trains collided. Fortunatir, nogperson was seriously flurt by the collision. The troop train had on board the 37th Maasachu-The troop train had on board the 37th Massachustits Regiment, which came through on Monday night; a squad of recruits for the 13th New York Regiment, under Lieut. Minch; one hundred and four men of the Philadel, his Provost Guard, under Lieut. Lechler, and one hundred men of the 13th Pennsylvania Cavalry, under Capt McCann. The commands of Capt. McCann and Lieut. Lechler had been ordered; according to a despatch received from General Wool, on Monday evening, to guard the railroad and bridges between Perrysville and Staunton, on the line of the Baltimore Baltroad. They were under the command of Adjulant General Freese, and were proceeding upon their errand at the time of the accident. time of the accident.

The wreck of the two trains described completely obstructed the track, and information of the accident was telegraphed to the depot.

At half past three o'clock yesterday morning a special train, having upon it a squad of one hundred cavalry men, started South from the depot, at Broad and Washington streets, and the engineer was insureded to take another track, so as to avoid the obstruction. By some unaccountable carelessness or misunderstanding, the engineer went upon the obstructed track, and he ran into the two trains which were already wrecked. The engineer of the third train saw the lights about the wreck, and checked the speed of the locomotive, but the collision was, nevertheless, very severe, and the consequences most disastrous. The cars were broken to pieces, three men were killed outright; and a number were more or less wounded. The dead were s) entangled with the wreeklof men were mixed thright; and a number were more or less wounded. The dead were so entangled with the wreeklof the cars that a considerable time clapsed before their bodies could be extricated.

Lientenant Lechler immediately returned to the city, and Captain Kern, the provost marshal, having been notified, he and Dr. Neill at once proceeded to the scone of the accident. The bodies of the dead and the wounded were immediately convent to the score with the convent to the score was a second or the score of the Conrad.

About eight o'clock, yesterday morning, a member of a
New York regiment, who was at the scene of the dissater, deliberately drew his knife and inflicted injuries upon himself which will probably prove fatal. It is be-lieved he was laboring under an attack of mania-a-potu or delirium at the time. He was conveyed to the Hospital.
