PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 25, 1862. The slock and money circles were in a fever to day, thether from the favorable advices from our armies, the sesuring effects of the President's recent proclamation. the extraordinary case in the money market, is hard o determine. "Commission," George H. Stuart, Esq., No. 16 Bank HOSPITAL NEAR SHARPZDURG, Sept 22, 1862. My Dear Sir: You have no doubt been apprised of the diaster that befel the Corn Exchange Regiment, 118th P.V., at about 12 o'clock on Saturday last, on the opposite side of the Potymac, one mile distant from my present writing.

I sent a line or two on Saturday, and addressed a note I sent a line or two on Saturday, and addressed a note to Solomon Emith, Egg., and requested him to have you peruse it I would now state that yestercay I spent the cay on the field of battle, searching the dead bodies of these your fellows as they lay scattered upon the field of slaughter, for the purpose of identifying them. In all cases the pockets were rified and turned inside out, and the boots taken from their feet. As the result of siven hours' labor there are copious memoranda made.

I have in my possession numerous memeutos taken from those I have been able to identify, with the intention of giving them to their relatives at home. Several were found still living, severely wounded, who were brought over late in the afternoon.

Two hours more, perhaps, would have completed my investigations, but orders came from General Porter to vacate the field with all possible haste as they were about to shell the woods in the rear of us, where the rebels were encamped. There is a movement now on fect of several divisions of the army. The number of dead and wounded cannot now be positively ascertaiced.

Among the bodies I found yesterday you will grieve to learn was the son of brother Simous and Mr. Aloss; also the ton of Prof. Saunders, of West Philadelphia, and Capt. Eicketts, of Pine or Spruce street, usar Sixth. The hodies of the three first-named were brought over last evening. Mr. Constroe and Michighael, of Philadelphia, are here to take home the body of the latter, if a phia, are here to take home the body of the latter, it a flug of truce can possibly be obtained, which I think is doubtful in the present moving (or about to move) con-

How often resterday I had to suppress my tears in view of the touching scenes presented at every strp! May God sustain our brother Simons! The bodies named were buried last night at Sharpsburg. Brother Simons owes a debt of lasting gratitude to Lieutenant Crocker, whose family reside near to Brother Simons. I found his son at the base of a ravine where the regiment ascended the bluff. He was wounded in the neck. I have made a record of numerous incidents of these poer fellows, and did it alone. Our other brethren were otherwise engaged, and that assiduously. Should the committee of the Corn Exchange desire a statement of facts connected with this disaster, as well as the topography of the field, it might be furnished them.

We are now going to Sharpsburg, were we have about soventy of our wounded. Colonel Prevost rooms with me. I have had charge of him, under direction of the surgeon. Dr. Kingsbury leaves to-day, in charge of Colonel Prevost. Dr. James and myself may return in two or three days, in charge of such wounded as may to able to leave the hospital, if other arrangements at Frederick and Middletown should not interfere.
