

Extension of the Water Works. Mr. BAIRD submitted an ordinance making an appro-priation of \$900 000 for the further extension of the Waitr Works. The resolution, accompanying, that the ordinance be published, was agreed to.

Paving Streets.

Mr. QUINN, chairman of the Committee on Highways, reported an ordinance authorizing the Chief Commis-sloter to cater into a contract for the paving of Oddar street, between Lebigh avenue and Somerset street, and to cause the property owners interested to pay the costs, in case they do not pays the streets voluntarily. The Fire Department.

Mr. LOUGHLIN, chairman of the Committee on Fire Mr. LOUGHLNS, chairman of the Committee on Fire and Trusts, reported an ordinance making the term of service of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department three years, and that his salary be increased \$300. Mr. HARPER was opposed to the extension of the term of service of the chief engineer. He belaved that the Fire Department should be changed, and the time may soon come. In case the esgineer was foisted upon the otly for three years, we may have to pay him for service which he may not render, in case the office is abolished. Mr. LEIGN raised a question whether Councils could extend the term of service of the chief engineer, who was elected for two years by the firemen. was elected for two years by the firemen The ordinance passed, with a proviso, "Provided the Jopartment so long exists."

Message from the Mayor. The Mayor returned to Council, without his signature, the bill making appropriations for the repairing of bridges, culverts, &o., damaged by the recent freshet. bridges, culverie, &c., damaged by the recent treenet. The Mayor states the amount named for the construc-tion of bridges, is not warranted by a report made to him by the Chief Surveyor, for which \$40,000 would appear ample for such purposes; which the sum of \$25,000 for repairing inlets and onlyerts is greater than \$25,000 for reparting meas and onivers is greater man the original appropriation of the year, and it is believed, from inquiry, is largely in excess of the public necessi-ties. The objections are worthy of attention, in view of the unnicual expenses of the current year; but they uld not have been allowed to retard nece Would be have been showed to retard necessary repairs, if the terms of the proposed ordinance were not in plain violation of the act of consolidation. This prohibits mem-bers, whether as a committee or otherwise, from the pernce of any executive duty whatever ; but the ordi

Iormance of any executive duty whatever; but the ordi-nance in question enacts that the work of repairing and reconstructing the damaged bridges is to be done under "the direction of the Committee of Highways." The Mayor suggests that an ordinance be adopted ap-propriating such sums to the Department of Highways as may be dermed advisable for the repair or reconstruc-tion of the bridges and of the inlets, and that the Ohief Commissioner of Highways be authorized to proceed with the precessary work in accordance with the pars and the necessary work in accordance with the plans and under the supervision of the Offer Engine

The contideration of the ordinance was postponed. Mr. QUINN offered a new ordinance appropriating \$50,000 for the construction of the bridges and repairing

the inlets. Messrs. HARPER and DEIGH argued that the amount was even now too large. An amendment, altering the amount to \$40,000, was agreed to, and the bill passed.
