Lieutenent Alban F. Parsh, et Co. O., 71st Pennsylvania (Colliornia Regiment), was billed at the battle of Antietam, 8 ptember 17th. He enlisted on the 21st day of May, 18th, as a private, and in a short time was promoted to a sergeantcy, and, a few days before his death, to a lieutenantcy. He was remarkable for an amtable disposition. He possessed considerable literary talent. In enlisting in the cause of his country he had but one object—the preservation of the liberties guaranted by our forfetters.

His term of enlistment was one of savere trials. He had been in the army about a month when he was called His term of enlishment was one of sayere trials. He had been in the army about a month when he was called home to pay the last tribule of respect to a beloved sister. Shortly after his return the regiment left for Washington, and was moved from thence to Camp Advance, Ya; and, in a short period; was engaged in the skirmlakes of Falls Church and Lewinsville. After the engagement at Falls Church, the regiment moved to Pooleaville. In a few days after, the battle of Ball's Bluff occurred. Here he distinguished himself not only by bravery during the action, but by assisting many, who were unable to swim, to save themselves, after the day was decided against us. After rendering all the assis ance possible, he himself. After rendering all the assis ance possible he himself took to the water, and swam to the Meryland shore, while rebet bulles raised around him thick and fast. He encured the privations incumbent on a winter camp life without a murmur, feeling it to be his duty to suffer for

endured the privations incumbent on a winter camp life without a murmur, feeling it to be his duty to suffer for his country when necessary.

He was next engaged at the battle of Winchester, then at New Market, and Yorktown. Previous to the latter engagement, he wrote a private letter to his brother, in which, although expressing no fear, he gave instructions as regards his burial, should he fall. He was also engaged at Williamsburg, New Kent Court House, Fair Cake, White tak Swamp, Chicashominy, Charles City Cross Boads, Malvern Hills, Bull Ban, South Mountain, and Antietam. In the last-named battle, as before stated, he lost his life. An offiser, who was near him during the engagement, w ites to a friend as follows: "I stood by his side during the engagement, and noticed him fighting with remarkable heroism, until he was struck by a rebel bullet in the forthand a brave commander—his companions their warmest friend. So brave was his beart that his lips uttered not a groan; but he died as he lived, with a soul devoted to freedom." He was buried at Laurel Hill, in this city.
