To appreciate the responsibility of the office of UITY CONTROLLER, it must be remembered that all bills payable from the City Treasury must be examined by that official, and receive his approbation before payment Inamuch as it is impossible for one man to examine the multitude of bills presented, he appoints a number of sworn sids, upon whose judgment and integrity he is compelled to lean.

The clerk, then are applied to the compelled to the analysis and the clerk. compelled to lean.

The clerk, then, examines each bill laid before him, and, if correct, signifies the fact by endorsing it with his name, whereupon it is sent to the City Commissioners, who ascertain whether there is left a sufficient balance to pay the same, in the appropriation for that class of to pay the same, in the appropriation for that class of expenditure. If so, they draw a warrant for the amount. The City Controller, in person, then compares the warrant with the amount of the bill, as attested by his clerk, and if the amounts correspond he countereigns the warrant, and the City Treasurer cashes the same.

Now, supposing a creditor of the city should present or consive at a dishonest bill, and suggest to a dishonest clerk the policy of sharing the difference between the sum really due and that demanded, (technically called a 'Divy.') it will be at once perceived that the extent of

"Divvy,'') it will be at once perceived that the extent of fleece, of which the city is shorn, will be exactly com-mensurate with the boldness and depravity of the ope-In December, 1856, a bill of items for Sheriff's fees, amounting to \$583, to which six dollars was added to pencil, making, altogether, the sum of \$589, was presented at the Controller's office for examination. George Getz, then a clerk, had charge of the desk to which it was referred. Getz folded the bill, and on its back wrote that it was a bill for \$389, being \$300 more than the sum really due. He then fabricated an alleged copy of the

It will thus be seen that no attempt was made to itemize; the fabricated bill, nor to account in any way for the mystericus addition of the \$300. The City Commissioners, finding the bill certified by a sworn clerk, and the appropriation for the item of sheriff's fees sufficient to cover the smount, of course approved the bill. The City Controller himself unsuspectingly followed the usual course, countersigned the warrant, (No. 3918,) and the treasury of the city was made to pay the additional amount of \$300.

In corroboration of this statement we refer to page \$13 of the Journal of Common Courcil, onding May, 1858. of the Journal of Common Coucell, onding May, 1888.
There may be found a letter from the Controller to the Sheriff, religive to certain overpaid fees, &c., from which we take the following extract:

"I also find that you were paid December 31st, 1886, 2880, and are appropriate made December 31st, 1886, 3880, and 3880, \$889, under an appropriation made December 30th, 1856, whilst your bill for Cotober term of that year by the Court cells for only \$589, making a difference of \$300.

Since Getz has been a candidate for Controller, he has issued a circular boasting of his "experience, thorough knowledge, confidence," etc., and subscribing himself as "Truly your friend." The amount of his "experience" will be known when we state that he was appointed in July, 1856, and discharged in May. 1857, by the same Controller who had appointed him.
