The Fair at Norristown. AN ATTRACTIVE DISPLAY.

The second annual exhibition of the East Pennsylvania Agricultural and Mechanical Society began yesterday at Norristown, and will continue to-day and to morrow. otwithstanding the fact that the war has almost mont polized the inventive genius of our people for more than a year past, the display, if we may judge from the articles on exhibition yesterday, will equal in interest that of any former year, while the attendance seems to have suffered but little diminution. If so many patent ploughs, cider presses, cort-mills, and reapers have not been entered as would have been in a time of peace, the increased interest amply compensates for this deficiency, and, altogether, the efforts of the society to make a creditable exhibition have been attended with encouraging success. There were at least one thousand persons on the ground yesterday, and the avenues leading thither were constantly thronged with visitors. A large delegation of the yeomanry of adjoining counties was present, and this city likewise contributed a generous quota.

HOW THE GROUND LIES.

The Fair ground, which is several screet in extent, is quadrilateral shaped, and though lavel in itself, is situated on the summit of an easy elevation, while is sufficiently high to afford a fine view of Norristown and the country for miles around, but not inconvenient of soccess on that account, even to an asthmatic person. HYDRAULICS.

Actual experi-ments determine that these twenty-one buckets will not be n one than five-eighths full when in ordinary motion. A wheel built on the model has ground offe barrel of flour per hour, with four cubic fest of water per second, under a head of 3.25 feet, with a head and fail of uinsteen fest. The maximum power secured by this wheel is .721 per cent, which is believed to exceed that of any over-shot wheel ever before constructed. 
