Discreet and trustworthy agents are constantly employed in visiting all divisions of the srmy, including those on the Southern coast, the Missispip, and the Western frontier, to observe their wants, to direct supplies where they are most needed, and to secure, as far as practicable, their honest use. The Commission dees not undertake to deliver articles to individuals, and declines to receive contributions with any restriction as to their destination, within the limits of the force employed in the service of the Nation, it being one of its secondary objects to strengthen the sentiment of National unity wherever it can ome in antagonism
