IMPORTANT TO THE DRAFTED MEN-THE MILITARY COMMANDANTS .- On Saturday an order was issued from Harrisburg, by Adjutant Generai Themas, to the following offect: "The officers of Pennsylvania volunteers, with their non-commissioned officers, are relieved from the duties assigned them in the special order of the 5th instant, and will immediately join their respective regiments."

By this order, it will be seen that the officers who were here for the purpose of receiving detachments of the drafted men, to fill up the old regiments now in the field, have been ordered back to their different posts, which is of course tantamount to the rescinding of the first order on the subject of taking the men in question for the old ents. In view of these facts, it is thought that it is the intention of the War Department to submit the matter of the organization of companies and regiments of the drafted soldiers to the men themselves. It is said that a full understanding has been had between the State Goverpment and the War Department, and that the matter at issue has been satisfactorily arranged, and that the drafted men are conceded the right of controlling their own organization. This of course obviates all difficulty. The right which the State Administration has irelated upon is thus acknowledged, and all cause for disentisfaction removed. It now becomes the drafted men to be careful how they select inexperienced or incapacitated officers to lead them into-battle, and as much of the late trouble in relation to the men going into the old regiments can be traced to those who were fearful that, by such a movement, they would lose positions of command, let the men themselves now apoak on the subject. Since it is no longer a subject of force to compel tham to go into the old regiments, let all those who are convinced they cannot find competent men to lead them among those drafted, make it a matter of choice, and at once offer to enter the old regiments voluntarity. The man who want; to do good service, and at the same time become useful to himself, will not refuse, under all the circumstances, at once to enter an old company or regi-

Brigadier General Innis M. Palmer, who has been or dered to Camp Philadelphia, will at once proceed with the work of organizing the drafted men into companies and regiments. General Palmer is a fine soldier, and will, no doubt, give great satisfaction in the performance of these new duties. Brigadier General Palmer was born in the State of New York, and was appointed a cadet to Military Academy at West Point in 1842. He graduated on the first July, 1846, when he was brevetted a second lieutenant of mounted rifles. For gallantry and meritorions conduct in the battles of Contrerss and Churubusco, Mexico, on the 20th of August, 1847, he was brevetted first licutenent in August, 1848. In March, 1861, he was made captain for gallantry and metitorious conduct at the battle of Chapultenec, 13th September. 1847. In this battle he was wounded. On the 231 of | and if disabled soldiers can be found capable of fulfilling September, 1861, he was made a brigadier general of volunteers, and served with credit during the Peninsular campaign as a commander of a brigade in Gen. Casev's divisien. In consequence of a reorganization of the Army of the Potomac, Gen. Palmer was accidentally thrown out of immediate command in the field, reported at Washington for duty, was assigned to the command of the paroled prisoners at Annapolis, and was then ordered to his present command, under General Andrew Porter, who now commands the military district of

Pennsylvania The command of the drafted men at Pittaburg has been given to Brigadier General E. B. O Canby, under similar orders to these of Gen. Palmer. Gen. Uanby also completed his campaign in New Mexico with great credit. He was born in the State of Kentucky, and appointed a cadet from the State of Indiana, in 1835. He graduated at West Point on the 30th of June, 1839, and on the 1st of July of the same year was appointed a second lientenant in the 2d infantry; he was promoted first lieutenent, 2d infantry, June 18, 1846. It was in this grade that he exhibited staff qualities of the highest order, and accordingly he was at once selected as the regimental adjutant. On the 3d of March, 1847, he was appointed assistant adjutant general in the regular staff of the army, and on the 20th of August, 1847, he was brevetted a major "for gallant and meritorious conduct in the battles of Contre as and Churubusco, Mexico." On the 15th of September, 1847, he was again brevetted lieutenant colonel " for gallant conduct, &c, at De Belen Gate. Mexico." When the 10th Regiment United States Light Infantry was organized, in March, 1855, he was selected as one of the mejors, and again when the additional regiments were raised, in 1861, he was apnointed colonel of the 19th United States Infantry. His present commission as brigadier general of volunteers is hero of an arduous campaign against the rebels, assisted by mercenary Indians, in the Territory of New Mexico. Shortly after his appointment as brigadier general the rebellion was crushed in New Mexico, and he was ordered to report at Washington for duty, when it was the President's design to place him in active service, but the hardships of his terrible campaign in the Southwest having impaired his health very much, he was tendered and has accepted his present command.
