



The build-ing will be forty feet high, one hundred and fortyfour feet long, and fifty six feet deep, and will be surrounded by a colonnade, and topped with a dome, all, with the exception of the windows and doors, to be built of ice. A few hours's sunshine would make the frigid fabric melt away in tears like an architecfursh Niobe. 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
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
