NEW YORK CITY.

[Special correspondence of The Press. NEW YORK, Jan. 28, 1863. THURLOW WEED'S SECESSION from the Republican party, as formally announced by him in his editorial valedictory, in his Albany-Journal of yesterilay, is published by all the papers here to-day, and commented on as an event of some moment. It is a significant fact, that the audaclously disloyal World favors the famous politician with a whole column of fulsome eulogy, as though his secession from the ranks of his own party meant an immediate enlistment with its own treasonable foes to the Government. Since Mr. Weed's return from his very puerile European mission, he has been regarded with more or less suspicion by the leading Republicans of this city; for it was not long in doubt that his association-brief as it was-with the British aristocracy, had imbued him with a species of "conservative" heresy as to the dominant-planks in the platform of the straight-out Union party. Then came signs of his fresh affiliation with Bennett, of the Heraid, and a certain friendliness with Fernando Wood. All doubt of his intentions were put at rest when he commenced to ornament the leaders of his Journal with the stereotyped Democratic flings against the "mad Abolitionists," and at last the old gentleman retires from the field altogether. To suppose that his desertion will cause a split in the party is folly, since there is nothing more sure than that its unity is happily secured by his timely secession. MAJOR GENERAL BURNSIDE arrived in town, at about 11 o'clock last night, and proceeded immediately to the Fifth-avenue Hotel, where his wife had been awaiting him since Monday evening.
