REVENUE CASE—TAX ON CLOTHING.

Bennett & Co. vs. United States Collector and Assessors. This is a bill in equity, filed by the complainants to restrain the defendants from proceeding with the levying and collection of a tax or duty of three per centum on all clothing manufactured since the first fof September, 1862. The complainants allege that the tax is not chargeable because that upon every material of which said clothing is composed, there has been paid to the United States the full tax and duty required by law and duly assessen thereon, and that they have added to the said materials nothing but labor to convert them into gaments. garments.

The answer of the defendants sets up that the court has no power to grant the injunction asked—lat. Because the delendants are officers of the United States, and are not amenable to this jurisdiction for such acts done, or proposed to be done, by them as are the subject matter of this complaint, under the color of authority conferred by the law of the United States. 2d. Because the present is a case arising under the revenue laws of the United States, of which the Circuit Court of the United States has exclusive layed to the United States has exclusive Jurisdiction.

3d. Because the assessment of taxrs or duties is a judicial act on the part of the assessors, which a court of equity will not attempt to prevent or control by injunction. trol by injunction.

4th. Because the complainants have full and perfect remedies at law for every injury they may sustain by reason of the acts of defendants.

5. Because courts of equity have uniformly demicd their jurisdiction to grant relief in cases identical with the present.
