Frowert said the same party intended to go into the country to commit another robbery. An agreement was made that Smith was to call on Frowert at his residence to get some of the goods. He called, but failed to obtain any. In answer to several questions propounded by the alderman, Mr. Smith replied that his desire was not to get any of the goods, but merely to obtain all the information he could, which he intended to communicate to the authorities.
