The Supreme Court had decided that a municipal corporation has no right to become a subscriber to a private improvement company. Since the former bill was before Councils, he found, in a new volume of opinions from the Supreme Court; just issued, that it required a special act of legislation before a municipal corporation could become a stockholder in another corporation. Inasmuch as such authority cannot be given under our Constitution, therefore it is unterly impossible to become a subscriber to this concern. The ordinance is clearly illegal, and in direct violation of the Constitution of Pennsylvania.

A vote was then taken on the bill, and it was defeated by the following vota:

The memorial of the undersigned, presidents of insurance companies, and agents of insurance companies doing business in said city, respectfully represents to your hemorable bodies that the storing of petroleum, and what is usually denominated coal oil, within the limits of the city, is a matter which, in their opinion, requires the serious consideration of Councils. The well-known insummable character of such oils, and their explosive qualities, render their presence dangerous in any neighborhood near which they may be stored. Your memorialists therefore respectfully suggest the advisability of enacting an ordinance regulating the storage of petroleum and coal oil and their products within the city in such manner as Councils may see fit and proper. (Then follow the signatures.)

The Mayor returned to Council, without his approval. Veto Messages.

The acts incorporating various gas companies require that the streets broken up for the introduction of gas shall be repaired as soon as rracticable, by the companies, at their own expense.

The conceindration of the ordinances were postponed for the present.

The Finance Committee reported a resolution empowering the clerk of Councils to advertise a loan to pay for the drainage of the city, which was agreed to.

The same committee reported a supplemental ordinance, prescribing the duties of the Receiver of Taxes. Agreed The Highways.

The Committee on Highways, reported an ordinance making an appropriation for the purpose of grading and macadamizing Green lane, in the Twenty-second ward, from the Second street pike, to York pike, providing the expense does not exceed \$5,000; and provided, also, that the owners of property along the line shall pay one-third the expense. Adopted.

The same committee reported an ordinance providing for the grading of Twenty-second street, from South to Catharine, which was also agreed to.

Also, a resolution authorizing the paying of Mayland street, Sixth ward, with tran may stone, and the grading of Taylor street, Nineteenth ward, which were adopted.

Mr. Lower, of the Committee on Poor, reported an ordinance appropriating to the Guardians of the Poor \$3,000, to provide for additional boilers at the Almshouse, and also to meet the advanced price of coal Agreed to. Claims Against the City.

Mr. Smith, of the Committee on Claims, reported an ordinance appropriating \$688.63 to pay certain claims against the city; among them was one of \$100, by a Cohen, which occasioned much debate. It was stated that the claim of the latter had been before Councils for eighteen years, and had been always set aside. Mr. Moons, one of the members of the committee, said that it was resolved to give Mr. Cohen \$100 in order to get rid of his importuning. There was no justice in the claim, but it is worth that much to get rid of him. The ordinance was agreed to.

Resolutions of instruction to the Chief Commissioner of Highways, to have paved Wharton, Summer, and other streets, were submitted; and referred to the Committee on Highways.
