At least a hundred men who have had experience in the cavalry service, and would make efficient soldiers, applied at the armory on Wednesday, and asked to be taken as recruits. It was impossible, however, to get them armed and equipped, and it was not deemed expedient to send them in any other way. Some members who could not leave yesterday went last night; others are yet to go, besides several recruits who have obtained arms and uniforms, and, if the troop should be needed for a week, they will number seventy recreating the horse tents recruits. As far as could be ascertained, there was no damage done to the shipping along the Delaware. About one hundred feet of the Market street bridge was carried away by the wind.

The trees about Fairmount Park suffered considerably. Many of them were stripped of their foliage, and a number of large limbs were lost. A large buttonwood tree which stood near the forebay, was torn up by the roots. A large tree at Twenty-fith street and Pennsylvania avenue shared the same fate.

The roof of a cooper-shop on Coates street, near Pennsylvania avenue, was blown off. and fell into the yard of one of the adjoining dwellings. Three women made a very narrow escape from being struck by the falling shingles.

A portion of the remainting walls of a factory on Ninth street, above Girard avenue, which had been destroyed by fire several months since, were blown down.
