He related how he had found acceptance among all classes of the people in Holland. Very manygreat crowds-assembled, who could not understand his language, but they wanted to see his face because God had blessed his translated sermons to the salvation of their souls. He added, that while the oor had crowded around him, it had pleased God to move the heart of the Queen of Holland to send for him; and for an hour and a quarter he had the

GLOSING CHURCHES IN SUMMER.—The Christian Observer, of New York, in an article upon the im-policy of entirely closing many of the churches in our large cities during the summer months, makes the following sensible comments: "The city during the months when churches are so closed is crowded with strangers, and especially has this been the case since the commencement of the war. It is just and proper that the pastors should have a recess for relaxation. They need it, and the time so spent is a gain to their flocks as well as to themselves. But their absence does not ne-cessitate the closing of the doors of their churches. There are many able preachers who could be se-oured for the vacant pulpits, and whose ministra-tions could not fail of doing good. We hope to see very few closed doors this summer. PURCHASE OF ANOTHER CATHOLIC CHURCH.— It is gratifying to see that liberalism is so much taking the place of former prejudices in New Eng-land. It may be said, and mostly as a general thing, that in many places a spicit of opposition to Catholicity is slowly and gradually, but certainly assuming less offensive proportions.' Good sense is doing away with religious and party feelings of all kinds, is attaining a higher standard than it pos-sessed some years ago. As a proof of this liberal spirit alluded to, we are pleased to announde the purchase of another Protestant meeting-house, in South Dedham, by Rev. P. O'Beine, with the so-operation of the Catholic Dopulation of that vi-cinity. The people of South Dedham atood very much in need of a Catholic Church, as such a blessing has not hitherto been conferred upon them.
