THE LATE COL. MAHLER.-The body of THE LATE COL. MAHLER.—The body of Col. Francis Mahler, of the 75th Regiment Pennsyl-yania Volunteers, has artived in this city. Col. Mabler was wounded in the battle of Friday, but refused to leave the field, and was subsequently wounded twice, and died from the effects of his inju-ries on Saturday morning. The deceased was an accomplished gentieman and a brave soldier, much beloved by his command. He was born in Germany, where he was a classmate of Gen.-Franz Sigel, and was, with the General, attached to the Liberal army. He then came to this country, and upon the formation of the 75th Regiment he accepted the position of lieutenant colonel from Col. Bohlen, who commanded the regi-ment at that time.
