The Price of Coal.

To the Editor of The Press : SIR : The present high price of coal in our market has so aroused the people that they are anxious to know the cause. I will attempt to explain the cause. In the first place, the Reading Rallroad Com-pany and the Schuylkill Navigation Company have put the prices of freight up to an extravagant figure. Secondly, the miners of the coal have been seized with a desire to grow rich, and the coal merchant who sells the coal here, partaking of the same desire. an uncalled for rise in the price is the consequence. I am informed that there is nothing to justify such increase of prices, as the additional expenses in-curred in the mining and freight would not increase the price of coal here more than one dollar and a half to two dollars per ton ; therefore, the excess in prices of five or six dollars per ton grows out of the combination of the miners, railroad company, and seller. Such a course has aroused the public to such an extent that n strong effort will be made at the meet in to such an ing of our next Congress to have the duty taken off of foreign coal, that our coal operators may hereafter have a clear field for action, and have an opportu-nity to make as large fortunes as they can by fair trade. I am informed that foreign coal can be imported from England and sold here for less than seven dollars per ton, notwithstanding the high rate of exchange; and if it be brought in British bottoms, no extra risk will be incurred for insurance, &c. An effort will be made by the suffering masses, who are deeply interested in this matter, to netition our
