ANOTHER BRAVE PHILADELPHIAN LOST. ANOTHER BRAVE PHILADELPHIAN LOST. -Lieutenant Edward Everett Coxe. of Co. D. 119th Pennsyivania Voluateers, died at Harewood Hos-pital, Washington, on Sunday, Nov. 22, 1663, from wounds received while storming the rebel breast-works at Rappabanock on the 11th instant. Lieutenant Coxe was, in the absence of the captain, leading his company up the bill to the charge which caried the works, when he fell and was carried to the rear.
