"How Long?" To the Editor of The Press:

Sir: Thinking your numerous readers might be interested in knowing something of the home workings of rebellion, take the liberty of sending you a short extract from a letter, by a young lady of Virginia to her aunt in this city, both of whom are very near relatives of mine. It may not be amiss to say that, at the time this rebellion broke out, the father of this young lady was the owner of an excellent farm, together with all the hands and stock necessary to carry it on successfully and profitably, and no doubt was worth at least twenty thousand dollars. A sad contrast with his present condition, if the statement of his daughter be true! Of its entire truthfulness I do not entertain a doubt. "How long, O Lord! how long" are this people to be deluded and led on to destruction by their infamous and wicked rulers? But to the extract. Her letter is dated May 18, 1864:

"We are sorely dopondent; haven't an ounce of mont, dust of flour or meal, grain of wheat, sugar, coffee or tea, nor two barrels of corfi. The guards are very kind to us, they assist us as much as they can. General—told papa this morning that he would send us some provisions. We have not any way to send for anything, but he said he would send it to us. Very few officers have been here: those who have are very kind and polite. Mother and papa's health is very bad; they are very thin; papa seldom goes off of the farm; everything is very high. At last accounts flour was \$325 per barrel, meal \$60 per bushel, sugar \$10 per pound, callee \$13 to \$16 per yard, shoes \$75 to \$100 per pair, becon, middling, \$13 per pound, hams not so high. You can imagine at what exponse a family lives. I expect, if the army leaves, we will have to starve.

St. Louis Union, May 18. . Louis Union, May 18. THE CITY. THE UNITED STATES CHRISTIAN COMMISSION.
The following item relative to the work of the Christian Commission, as received from Mr. George H. Stuart, the chairman thereof, will exhibit the great amount of good already done to the soldiers wounded in the recent battles. Mr. Stuart says:
"Having just returned from a week's visit to the wounded in the late battles in Virginia, in company with Bishop Mellvdine, of Ohio, it gives me great pleasure to assure the friends of those noble heroes throughout the country that our Government is doing everything in its power to relieve suffering; more than any Government ever did before; and that we found the work of the Christion Commission throroughly organized, with an efficient corps of over two hundred and fifty (250) volunteer delegates laboring incessantly for the temporal and spiritual comfort of our soldiers.

"As the result of one day's labor at the headquarters of the Commission in Frederickburg, we brought up with us nearly three thousand letters, written for disabled soldiers by the delegates of the Commission.

"The great difficulty is in the transportation of sup-MILITARY. mission.

"The great difficulty is in the transportation of supplies. Encouraged by the generous contributions of the people to our treasury, we have made arrangements to remedy this by purchasing and sending forward two additional wagons with eight horses. We also chartered two schooners and a tug boat. To make the work of the Commission more efficient on the field, we arranged for a set of delegates to work by day and another by night, so that there will be Christian men always present to minister to the sick and wounded, and to stand by the bed-side of the dying. The delegates of the Commission have accomplished a wonderful work, gaving hundreds of lives, and relieving untold sufsaving hundreds of lives, and relieving untold suf-fering. They are still at their posts. It remains for the Christian philanthropic people of the land to keep them supplied with the mans of carrying on and increasing their labor of love." UNION VOLUNTEER REPRESHMENT SALOON.

The 14th Brooklyn Regiment, Col. E. Fowler, nrived from Washington about two o'clock yesterday afternoon, and was regailed at the Union Volunteer Refreshment Saloon. The regiment numbers about 140 men, all looking hardy, with the exception of a few who were wounded in the late engagement near Spottsylvania. This regiment passed through here on the way South on the 14th day of May, 1861, and has participated in all the battles of the Army of the Potomac, commencing with Bull Run, excepting the Peninsula battles, when they were under Goneral Pope. They were well received at the Saloon, and, by the kindness of some lady visitors, they were furnished with ice cream. Their flag, which bore evidence of much hardship, was embellished with a tri-colored rosette by Mrs. Watson, whose daughter, Miss Mary S. Watson, since deceased, had made and promised to this regiment if it should return with its colors. The first color-bearer was wounded, when his brother took his place and was killed.
