DEATH OF A GALLANT PHILADELPHIAN. Lieut. William Kirk, of the 6th Pennsylvania Gavairy (formerly Col. Rush), died at Alexandria on Tuesday evening. Lieut. Kirk, it will be ro-membered, was badly wounded in the thigh at Todd's Tavern, in May last, and from that point was subsequently removed to Alexandria, whore he has since been tenderly watched ovor. The cause of his death is attributed to pneumonia, with which he was attacked subsequent to his removal from the battle-field, and not to the wound described, from which it was thought he would ultimately recover. He had been connected with the Army of the Po-tomac for very nearly three years, his time of sor-vice expiring towards the close of the present year.
