The Progress of the Sieges of the two Official Changes in Graut's Army-It is Visited by Secretary Seward-Cavalry Operations in Sherman's Army. The siege of Petersburg progresses slowly. Fitful artillery duel and picket fights break the monotony. The Petersburg Express still makes its fifteenminute trips. Our latest advices from Grant detail official changes, and announce the advert of a longed-for blessing, rain. A Mr. Brown, who appears to be a resident of Petersburg, in a letter to the Richmond Whio, asserts that Grant has undermined the city, and that the " brilliant expoit " prophesied by the "Yankee press" will be the elevation into the air, for a short period, of Petersburgand all its war-like appliances and occupants. Of the operations at Atlanta, the accounts reach-ing us are very meagre, and ombrace little more than details of the battle of last Friday. The re-moval of Johnston from the command of the rebel army has occasioned a good deal of indignation among rebel journals, most of them clinging to him as the "savicur of Georgia," even though he seems to have been fast losing it by constant retreats. Confidence in him was unabated, even in the midst of reverse. Our army before Atlanta, it is feared, will experience the same suffering for want of water


