After accertaining, by a strict examination, that the child was firmly resolved to enter the asylum and embrace Christianity, the rector could not, without a dereliction of duty, refuse to admit him and to lay the fact before the superiors of the asylum. Thereupon, one of the cardinals charged with the direction of the establishment, sent for young Cohen to Frascati, to examine him as to his determination and take legal note of it.
