This arrangement is pronounced by the revised penal code as gambling; the penalty being fixed at not more than \$500 fine, and not more than five years imprisonment. The defendants were committed to answer.

A BRUTAL PRISONER.

A young man, giving the name of Edward Shannon, was arraigned yesterday on the charge of attempted robbery and committing an assault and battery upon Police Officer Lawrence. It is alleged that the prisoner was discovered in the act of robbing the money-drawer at the drug store of Dr. Marselis, on South Fourth street, about 9 o'clock yesterday morning. He made a hasty retreat, but was captured by the police officer. The daring fellow wriggled in the hands of the officer, and finally bit him on the left eyebrow, thereby producing a painful wound. Several stitches had to be made to keep the wound closed and the eyebrow in its proper place. The defendant is regarded as a common thief, as he has often been seen loitering about a thieves' den in the Fourth ward. The name he gave is fictitious. He was committed to answer.
