In times like these, when a desolating war is rayaging the country, destroying, in its bloody train, thousands, tens of thousands, and hundreds of thousands of brave and heroic veterans (white and colored), whose feats of valor have not been excelled by the warriors of ancient or modern times, and have gone forth at their country's call to suppress the rebellion, which, we hope, will soon be realized.

Knowing that although we cannot participate in the strike on the battle field, we can do much towards alleviating the sufferings of the sick and wounded soldiers now languishing in the camp and hospitals, and are anxious and willing to tender our assistance as far as we are able.

One great drawback to our efforts and desires to assist and relieve the soldiers, as well as the efforts of their wives, children, and friends, in the same direction, is the refueal of the directors of the city passenger cars to allow colored persons to ride, thus rendering it obligatory upon all who visit to hire private conveyances, at exorbitant rates, spending money that could be, were it otherwise, appropriated to the benefit of the soldiers, who went forth to fight the battles of their country, but have returned maimed, sick, and wounded, and, in hundred of cases, are deprived of seeing those near and dear to them, in consequence of being unable to pay carriage hire, and eventually have passed from the busy seenes of life, without an opportunity being afforded of bidding a final adien to wife, children, relations, or friends.

Having been solicited by the ladies of the United States Sanitary Commission to become an auxiliary, we responded to the request, and organized our association April 19, 1853. We feel it due the public, as well as the kind friends who have patronized us since the formation of our association, to state the progress we have maderom that time up to the present. We have our weekly meetings to make up clothing, and send monthly contributions of such articles as are needful for the sick and wounded soldiers, which have always been duly acknowledged. We have paid four or five visits to Camp William Penn, and three to the Summit House, carrying with us such delicacles as we thought best adapted to the wants of the sick and wounded soldiers.
