THE ASSASSIN'S PRELIMINABLES TO FLIGHT. About the beginning of the second sot, the mare, standing in the stable in the rear of the theatre, was disturbed in the midst of her meal by the entrance of the young man who had quitted her in the after-noon. Having completed these preparations, Mr. Booth entered the theatre by the stage-door; summoned one of the scene-shifters, Mr. John Spangler, emerged through the same door with that indi-vidual, leaving the door open, and left the mare in his hands to be held until he (Booth) should return.

SECRETARY SEWARD'S ORAMBER. In Secretary Seward's chamber, a similar al-though not so solemn a scene prevailed; between that chamber and the one occupied by President Lincoin, visitors alternated to and fro through the night. If that been early ascertained that the wounds of the Secretary were not likely to prove mortal. A wire instrument drawn zeros the sides of his head and under his shoulders, to relieve the pain which he suffored from his previous injuries, prevented the kulfe of the assaustin from sufking too deep. The right check was laid open to the bone, and a fearful gash inflicted in the other. The neck was pierced in two pieces, but no arteries were more schous. His forehead was stoven in by the blow from the pistol, and up to this hour he has re-mained perfectly unconscious. MR. EEWARD INFORMED OF THE ACTS OF THE ASSASSING. Secretary Seward, who cannot Speak, was not in-formed of the assassination of the President, and the injury to his son, until yesterday. He had been worrying as to why Mr. Lincoln did for visit him. "Why doesn't the President come to ses me?" he asked with his pencil. "Where is Frade-rick, what is the matter with him ?" Perceiving the nervous excitement which these doubts occa-finely determined that it would be best to let the Secretary know the worst. Secretary Stanton was chosen to tell him. The curtain had arisen on the third act, and Mrs. Mounchessingion and Ase Trenchard were exchang-ing vivacious stupidities, when a young man, pre-cisely resembling the one described as J. Springing into the box through the door of which he had just retreat-ed, he dropped hispistol on the floor, and drawing a bowle-knife, struck Major Rathbone, who opposed him, ripping through his coat from the shoulder down, and inflicting a severe fish wound in his arm. He leaped then upon the velvet-covered balastrate at the frent of the box, between Mrs. Lincoln and Miss Harris, and, parting with both hands the flags that dropped on sither side, dropped to the stage be-neath. Arising, and turning full upon the sudience, with the inific lifted in his right hand above his head, he shouted: "Sic senser tyrammis—Virginia is avenged!" Another instant and he had fiele aerosis the stage and behind the scenes. Colonel J. B. Stewart, the only person in the audience who seemed to com-prehend he dee he had committed, ollmbod from his seat near the orchestra to the stage, and fol-lowed close behind. The assassin was too fleet and tco desperate. Meeting Mr. Withers, the leader of the orchestra, just behind the scenes, he struck him aside with a blow that fortunately was not a wound ; overturning Miss Jenny Gourlay, an ac-tress, who came next in his path, he gained, with-out further hindrance, the back door previously let open at the erse of the theatre ; rushed through it ; leaped upon the horse held by Mr. Spangler, and without vonchasing that person a word of in-formation, rode out through the alley leading into F street, and thence rapidly away.
