The King cannot continue the campaign without the aid of his banker, while the potent majesty of the treasure-vault decides which side he shall favor in the contest, and his mandate carries success or failure. Such is the real solution of many a historical problem that has puzzled the students of its huge tomes That the secret potency of the money lender is no fancy confined to the brain o the romencist, or to those episodes of pas history when the fate of a nation depended on a page of a banker's book to be cancelled by a woman's jewels, can be seen by a glance at European affairs. The influence of the banker upon even the most

powerful Governments may be judged by a mere surmise of how the "balance" at ROTHSCHILDS' could affect the "balance of power" to morrow. But our own present history contains no such secret page where the loves and hates of Lombard or Jew turn the scales of justice or embarrass the operations of our Government. That clever brain which has conquered its way to the throne of France, and now so cleverly manages what it so cleverly won, first attempted the policy of raising a national loan from the people. What that brilliant statesman succeeded in accomplishing on a small scale for his own advantage has been done by American patriotism to an extent that amazes the world, and gives a glorious proof of the perpetuity and solidity of our Republican system.
