MONTGOMERY, ALA., Sept. 18 .- On Saturday the chairman of the Committee on the Ordinance of Secession and the resolutions of the Convention of 1861, reported as follows: That all ordinances, resolutions and pro-geedings of the convention of 1861, with so much of the constitution adopted in the said convention as conflicts with the Constitution of the United States be declared null and void.
The ordinance was made the special order for Wednesday.
The Committee on the Abolition of Slavery reported an ordinance which was made the Special order for to-day.
Other reports were submitted of local inte rest. A resolution was offered instructing the Committee on Federal Relations to memorial ize the President respecting the action of the convention and the decree of the people giving a cordial support to his administration and in view of the action of this convention and the loyalty of the people the President be requested to proclaim a general pardon amnesty to all persons not included in his proclamation of the 29th of May last. The relution was referred to the Committee on Federal Relations. The business of the convention was fairly The business of the convention was fairly commenced to-day.

New Orleans, Sept. 20.—A special despatch from Montgomery, Alabama, to the Times, dated the 19th, says:

The State Convention reassembled to-day. Resolutions were offered that the president of the convention be requested to appoint a committee of five to procure the signatures of the members to a petition for the pardon of Jeff Dayis and forward the same to the President Davis and forward the same to the Presiden of the United States as early as practicable Referred to the Committee on Federal Rele A resolution that all the proposed amend ments to the State constitution, of a general character, except those relating to slavery, be referred to the people at the next general election, was referred. The ordinance abolishing slavery was taken np, and a lengthy discussion ensued there npon.
The Committee on Elections reported an ordinance for the election of Congressmen and State officers on the 1st of November. convention. It was finally ordered that the municipal election in Mobile and Montgomery should be held on the first Monday in December. The election for Congressmen and the State election was appointed for the first Monday in The Legislature will meet on the third Monday in November.

The ordinance abolishing slavery was postmed without debate. MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 20.—The convention to-day adopted a resolution requesting the Provisional Governor to call out the militia in each county to suppress disorder and lawness which exist in many counties. ATTEMPTS TO SHOOT HIMSELF—SAYS HE IS A
CORRESPONDENT OF THE NEW YORK HERALD,
ATTENDING LIEUT, GEN. GRANT. [From the St. Louis Democrat, Tuesday.] On Friday lasta not very prepossessing look ng gentleman, though with a glib tongue vent into the store of Mr. C. D. Sullivan, one Shoving the package over to Mr. Sullivan—at the same time casting his eyes into the street, up which a carriage was passing—he exclaimed, "There is the money all right—you can count it. There goes Lieutenant General Grant—I must go!" Before Mr. S. had time to remonstrate or "count his money," his customer had disappeared after the carriage. Hastily dissecting the healthy-looking package, Mr. S. discovered that its contents consisted of two or three old Democrats and the Same number of New York clothing-store lithographed advertising bills. He lost no time in locking up his store and acquainting Chief Laibold with the facts. The Chief promptly despatched Detectives Ebernich and Coring after the thief—he was no longer a "gentleman." Accompanied by Mr. Sullivan, they made good time—perhaps as good time as has been made during the present season—looking into this place and that, Mr. S. Keeping a particularly sharp lookout after padestirlans in gray. On the corner of Sixth street and Washington avenue, between eight and nine o'clock, a person wearing this color is observed crossing the street—quick as thought Mr. Sullivan grabs him and demands his diamonds. "He will give them up if he is released." He produces them. Mr. S. complies with the promise made, upon which the

"precious" man is seized by the officers above named and started in the direction of the central station. Unobservedly he draws a revolver, but the cocking of it betrays him, and he is it lieved of it. He says he will kill himself, at any rate, with or without a pistol. On reaching the police-station, he was taken into the office of Colonel Laiboud and searched. He gave his name as John Henry, and said he was from Ireland, though he has very little, if any, of the "sweet Irish broque;" said he was a correspondent and reporter of the New York Herald, and had in his possession bits of paper, upon which were discovered the peculiar hieroglyphics of the "short-hand man," as a proof of the assertion. He has travelled from the East with Lieutenant General Grant and suite as such.

The chief having been into the commissioners' room after the search had been made, passed through the first room into his private office, the prisoner following him. Col. Laiboid had previously taken off his uniform coat, laying it upon the table, preparatory to the donning of a citizen's coat. On entering the room, the prisoner must have seen a small revolver protruding from the breast pocket. Approaching the table with great rapidity of movement, he seized and cocked it, and, before he could be prevented, he had placed it against his breast and fired. The ball entered the left breast just below the nipple, coming out about six inches from the place where it entered, having glanced on a rib and creating but a fiesh wound. A surgeon was immediately called in, who dressed the wound. It bled profusely, but the prisoner did not seem to mind it. He begged for his pistol that he might put an end to his existence. The weapon was of course dended him, but he says he will kill himself yet—a pin will do it, and he knows how it is done. His case is a very clear one, which he admits; but he says his life is in his own hands, and he shall take it before lying long in a dungeon or going to the penitentiary.
