His confession in open court, according to the constitution of our country, is equivalent to the testimony of two witnesses. He stands, therefore, convicted of the highest crime known to our laws, and all that is wanting to render him infemous is a formal verdict. I say, therefore, he is incompetent. Again, this rebellion has been one gigantic act of treason—one common conspiracy to everthrow our Government. Not a single rebel engaged in it, according to the strict rules of law, is a competent witness for another on trial charged with treasonable offences, as he is an accessory before or after the fact, or a co-conspirator, or an accomplice, and therefore excluded. I say, then, until they are purged by special pardons, by a general pardon, or by acquittal before a competent court, no one of them ought to be permitted to testify for his associates.

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
