To the Citizens of York: I have abstained from burning the railroad buildings and car shop in your town, because, after examination, I am saisfied the safety of the town would be endangered; and acting in the spirit of humanity, which ea; and acting in the spirit of numanity, which has ever characterized my government and its military authorities, I do not desire to involve the innocent in the same punishment with the guilty. Had I applied the torch without regard to consequences, I would then have pursued a course that would have been fully vindicated as an act of just retaliation for the authorized acts of barbarity perpetrated by your own army on our soil; but we do not war upon women and children, and I trust the treatment you have met with at the hands of my soldiers will open your eyes to the odious tyranny under which it is ap-


