#### THE NEW POSTAL LAW. ITS LEADING PROVISIONS.

The new Postal Law, which goes into effect on the 1st of July, 1863, makes some important changes. The following digest of its leading provisions, compiled from the instructions received from the Postmaster General, has been prepared by the Postmaster (C. Postmaster for the instructions). of Reading, for the information of the public:

Letter Postage-Pre-payment, &c. Letter Postage—Pre-payment, &c.

On and after July 1, 1863, the single letter rate of postage will be three cents throughout the United States. The Pacific rate of ten cents is abolished.—An additional rate of three cents is required for each additional half ounce or fraction. Letters or civilians must be pre-paul in all cases. Letters written by non-commissioned officers or privates in the military or naval service, endorsed as such by a field or staff officer of the Regiment, or by a surgeon or chaphain at a hospital, to which such solder is aftacled, may be sent without pre-payment at the pre-paid rate, to be collected at the office of delivery. Unpaid letters, not so endorsed, deposited for mailing, when there is any reason to believe that such failure to pre-pay was the result of accident, ignorance, or any other cause than design, may be forwarded by charging them with double rates of postage, to be collected on delivery.

Local or drop letters must be pre-paid by stamps in all cases, at the rate of two cents for each half ounce or fraction thereof. But no fee is to be paid to the carrier for their delivery.

## Newspaper Postage.

Upon newspapers or other periodical publications, not exceeding the standard weight of four onneces each, issued once a week or oftener from a known office of publication, and sent to regular subscribers. age are as follows:

Heligious, educational and agricultural newspapers, of small size, issued less frequently than once a week, may be sent in packages to one address, at the rate of one cent for each package not exceeding four ounces in weight, and an additional charge of one cent is made for each additional four ounces or fraction thereof, the postage to be paid quarterly or yearly in advance.

Limitation of Weight. No Postmaster shall receive, to be conveyed by the mail, any packet or package which shall weigh more than four promsk, except books published or cir-culated by order of Congress.

Transient Matter.

Postage on all transient matter, including newspapers, magazines, pamphlets, engravings, seeds. &c. must be pre-paid by stamps, at the rate of two cents for each four contes of weight, or fraction thereof. Double this rate (that is four cents) is charged for Books by the same standard of weight.

All mail matter not sent at letter rates of postage, embracing newspapers, books, book manuscripts, proof sheets, and other printed matter, and all other mail matter except seeds, must be so wrapped or enveloped with open sides or ends as to enable the Postmaster to examine the package without destroying the wrapper, otherwise such packages must be rated with letter postage. No communication, whether in writing or in print, can be sent with any seeds, roots, cuttings or scious, maps, engravings, or other matter not printed, except upon the separate payment of postage upon such separate matter at the established rates.

Pre-Payment Required.

Section 3 of the new Post Office Law absolutely prohibits the delivery of any letter, newspaper, pamphled, or package whatever, until the postage charged thereon is paid. Postmasters are required to make out that they "have not knowingly delivered, or permitted to be detwered, to any person, any mail matter on which the postage had not been paid at the time of delivery." This order will be strictly enforced.

Authority to frank mail matter, except by the President and Vice President of the United States, and Members of the Cabinet, is restricted to official business. The instructions under this head say that "All correspondence addressed to any Executive "Department, or any officer in it, must now be prespaid, except official communications written by "some officer of the department, or an officer under "its control, or responsible to it; and in such cases, "under the words 'official business," on the envelope, "the officer must sign his name with his official designation. All other persons, and all officers written by a bublic officer, and all "to the Vice President, must pre-pay their postage. All communications to "the President not written by a public officer, and all "to the Vice President, must be pre-paid. All frank-"sing by gostmasters, or to them, except pron their "official communications to the Department, and to each other, is prohibited."

Registered Letters.

Registered Letters.

The fee for the registration of valuable letters is increased to tuenty couls, instead of five as heretofore. Additional safeguards are provided for the transmission and delivery of registered letters. Such registration, however, is not compulsory, and does not make the Post Office Department or its revenue liable for the loss of registered letters or their contents.

The new postal law provides for the free delivery.

The new postal law provides for the free delivery of letters by Carriers, in cities where the system can be made self-supporting by the additional charge of one cent on drop letters. Special regulations will be adopted by the Postmaster General, applicable to the several offices where the free delivery system shall from time to time be introduced.

At Post Offices where the gross receipts amount to ,000 or more per annum, letters are to be adver-sed once a neck. The Reading Office comes under
