CAPTURE OF JACKSON, MISS.

MOVEMENTS OF GEN. GRANT'S FORCES.

IMPORTANT CAPTURES AT NATCHES.

Official Dispatches from General Grant.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—The following official dispatches from Gen. Grant have been received:

Vicksburg, Miss., July 16. Major General H. Halleck, General in Chief: General Sherman has Jackson invested from the north in the night of the 13th. He has cut off many cars from the Confederacy. Sherman says he has force enough and feels no apprehension about the result.

Finding that Yazoo City was being fortified, I sent Gen. Herron there with a detachment of 2000 men, and several pieces of artillery. One steamboat was captured, and all the public stores fell into our hands. The enemy burned three steamboats on the approach of the gunboats.

The De Kalb was blown up and sunk in fifteen feet of water by the explosion of a torpedo. Finding that the enemy was crossing cattle for the rebel army at Natchez, and was said to have several thousand men there, I have sent steamboats and troops to collect them, and to destroy their boats and all means for making more.

Vicksburg, July 18, 1863. Major General Halleck, General in Chief: I have evacuated Jackson on the night of the 16th. He was completely cut off from the north, and I have no apprehension about the result.

The army paroled here have to a great extent deserted, and are scattered over the country in every direction.

Reporting that Yazoo City was being fortified, I sent General Herron there. Five guns were captured, together with many stores and about 200 prisoners.

Gen. Hanson was sent to Natchez to stop the crossing of cattle for the Eastern army. On his arrival he found a large number had been driven out of the city to be pastured; also, that manure was being recently crossed over to the north.

He captured a large number in both directions, and he sent a number of prisoners and 5,000 head of Texas cattle, 2,000 head of which were sent to General Banks. The balance have been and will be brought here.

In Louisiana we captured more prisoners and 250,000 rounds, besides artillery ammunition, and destroyed.

THE END OF MORGAN'S RAID.

His Forces Routed and Captured—Morgan Makes his Escape.

CINCINNATI, July 21. The following has just been received at Gen. Burnside's headquarters:

HEADQUARTERS OF THE U. S. FORCES, IN THE FIELD, GEIGER'S CREEK, July 20—9 P. M.

Gen. Morgan and his command over fifty miles to the north, and on the morning of the 20th he was seen in the distance of the 4th Ohio, of Col. Wolford's brigade, which was in advance, and the enemy, we succeeded in bringing him to a stand about three o'clock this afternoon, when a fight ensued, which lasted an hour.

The fight then fled, taking refuge upon a very high point, and demanding the immediate and unconditional surrender of Morgan and his command.

The Bag was received by Colonel Coleman and other officers, who came down and asked a personal interview. They asked an hour for consultation.

I granted forty minutes, in which time the command, excepting Morgan, who deserted his command, taking with him a very small number of men, and a few pieces of artillery, and Morgan himself had surrendered, and I learned that such was the understanding with Morgan's officers and men. The number of killed and wounded is inconsiderable.

The number of prisoners is between 1,000 and 1,500, including a large number of colonels, majors and lieutenants. I captured between 600 and 700 prisoners yesterday. I think I will capture Morgan himself to-morrow.

SHACKELFORD, Brigadier General.

WASHINGTON, July 21. Major General Burnside, in transmitting Brigadier General Shackelford's report to Major General Halleck, says:

"We have strong hopes of being able to capture Morgan and the remaining portion of his force, thus ending the heavy band. General Shackelford says the conduct and bearing of his own officers and men, without exception, evinced the greatest gallantry and a high degree of skill and discipline."

THE ARMY OF THE POTOMAC.

General Lee Supposed to be Cut off from Richmond.

Attempted Rebel Raid on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.

WASHINGTON, July 22, 1863. The relative situations of the armies in Virginia is to-day clearly understood here. It is apparent that General Meade has the rebel army cut off from Richmond, and that he is evidently about to move it through the Government, but will probably find it a more difficult undertaking than the one at Gettysburg.

After all the delay, there is now not much prospect of Lee being able to get his army back to Richmond, or even so far as the upper end of the Shenandoah valley.

BALTIMORE, July 22, 1863. About four hundred rebel cavalry, equipped with a large number of arms, and a few pieces of artillery, attempted to cross the Potomac last night with the intention of tearing up the rails of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. But their designs were frustrated by a band of independent rangers, commanded by Captain Meade, who drove them from the river. They remain still encamped at that quarter.

We learn further from headquarters that at about three o'clock this (Thursday) morning Lee's entire army was in motion and moving rapidly in the direction of Winchester. Several detachments of the rebel army, under the command of Lee, also fell back and followed Lee. There is no report now at Martinsburg, but a body of cavalry and some few horsemen scattered between that place and the Potomac. Scouts report an increased activity on the part of the rebels. They are supported by two regiments of infantry, one of which is dressed in Union uniforms.

THE RUMORED DISASTER AT CHARLESTON.

WASHINGTON, July 24, 1863. A faint rumor, whispered here yesterday, of disaster at Charleston, has taken the form of a dispatch to-day, and is telegraphed back here under the name of the N. York Daily News. The whole story is false, no attack having been made upon Charleston by land, and it is likely any such will be made in the future, but not on favorably. The capture of Fort Wagner and Cummings Point, and the reduction of Fort Sumter, are the immediate objects in view.

THE REBELS DESPONDENT.

The Richmond papers speak most despondently of the state of affairs in the rebel army, both in the West and in Virginia. The Richmond Dispatch of the 24th inst. says that the intelligence from General Lee falls far short of the promise of the despatches of the previous day, and would prove a grievous disappointment to the high wrought hopes of the public, and that, should the fall of Vicksburg, it casts a gloomy shadow over affairs in the Confederacy.

DEMOCRATIC MEETINGS.

DEMOCRATIC MEETING IN BERN.
