The notification served upon them by the Provot Marshal, is merely an unnouncement of the fac and an order for them to report for duty, at a designate threated place. and an order for them to report for duty, at a dosignated time and place.

11. The following opinion of the Hon. William Whiting, Solicitor of the War Department, is published for the information of all concerned: When a person has been drafted, in pursuance of the enrollment act of Merch 3, 1863, notice of such draft must be served-gwithin ten days thereface, by a written or printed notice, to be served on him personally or by leaving a copy at his least place of residence, requiring him to appear at a designated rendeavous to report for duty. Any person failing to report for duty after notice left at his leat place of residence, or served on him personally, without furnishing a substitute or paying \$300, is pronounced by law to be a deserter; he may be arcosted and held for trial by court martial and sentenced to death.

If a porson, after being drafted, and before receiving notice, deserts, the notice may still be served by leaving lat his last place of residence, and if he does not appear it accordance with the notice, or furnish the substitute or pay the \$300, he will be in law a deserter and must be treated. the \$300, he will be in haw a secrete and must be treated accordingly. There is no way or manuer in which a person, one entrolled, can escape his public duties, and when drafted, whether present or absent, whether he changes his residence or abscords, the rights of the United States against him are secured and Jaks only by performance of his duty to the country, that he will escape liability to be treated as a criminal. OPINION.

"A person drafted into the military service of the United States, under the provisions of the act of March 3, 1883, chapter 75, for 'enrolling and calling out the bational forces, and for other purposes, 'claiming exemption from draft by reason of any disability as provided in said act, base the right to have the question of his disability submitted to and passed upon by the Board of Eurollment, whose decision thereon is final. If the Board shall have decided that the claimant is Lable to sorve, he has the right, ofter such decision against him, to pay his commutation money, or to furnish his substitute, within such extended time as mey be fixed by the order of the Board of Enrollment-for his appearance for duty.
