At this moment a signal was given, and all the rebel batteries opened on Fort Sumter. The three boats were destroyed, and nearly all in them were killed or captured. The whole list of in them were killed or captured. The whole list of casualties was about eighty. The remainder of the party escaped without injury. Beauregard, says that he captured 113 prisoners, 13 officers, 4 beats and three colors. By a flag of truce we learn that the prisoners are in Fort Sumter and are well treated. THE LATEST—NEW BATTERIES ON MORRIS

ISLAND. The despatch steamer Mary Sanford, which arrived at New-York on Wednesday from Charleston, brings news to Saturday night, the 12th inst. General Gillmore was then erecting new batteries on Morris Island. The guns of the rebel batteries at Forts Moultrie and Johnson were firing heavily upon Morris Island. The raport that Fort Moultrie had surrendered, which riginated from the statements that a white flag criginated from the statements that is white high was fixing over the ramparts, proves to be a mistake, arising from the similitude of the rebel lattle flag to a flag of true. Moultrie is still in the hands of the enemy, and is working away with two fifteen-inch guus.

From the Army of the Potomac. cavalry Fight on the Rapidan.

On Sunday last, Gen. Pleasanton's Cavalry—under Generals Buford, Kilpatrick and Gregg—cossed the Rappahannock and reached the banks of the Rapidan; where they came into collision with Stuart's cavalry, and the light artillery of the enemy, and, after a series of skirmishes, drove them from point to point, until they reached Culpepper, through which town that charged, driving the reheles before them they charged, driving the rebels before them, and capturing over one hundred prisoners and three guns, two twelve-pounders and one sixpounder. A large quantity of ordnance stores were found in the railroad depot at Culpepper, the guns being of English make, with sabre bayonets attached. General Buford's division followed up the enemy beyond Cedar Mountain and encamped on the banks of the Rapidan our casualties were three killed and forty wounded. Among the latter was General Cus-ter, but not seriously. He commanded a brig-ade in General Kilpatrick's division, and was wounded while gallantly charging a battery of the enemy, in which charge three guns were cantured.

ANOTHER SKIRMISH ON THE RAPIDAN. There has been another skirmish on the Rap-idan. The Second Army Corps, which advanced to Culpepper after Pleasanton's late expedition, relieved the cavalry, who at once went out to the Rapidan. They attempted to cross the river ou Monday, but were resisted. Sixty Federal soldiers were wounded. One hundred and fifty of the enemy have been captured since Sunday. A scouting expedition has just returned from the Occoquan region. It discovered nothing and fourd no enemy. Large numbers of paymas-ters are leaving Washington for Gen. Meade's sumy. DESPATCHES FROM BURNSIDE AND ROSE-CRANS.

General Burnside sends an official despatch from Cumberland Gap, announcing the uncondi-tional surrender of that place, as before reported. He says that the infantry brigade which participated in the capture marched from Knoxville to the Gan. a distance of the Gap, a distance of sixty miles, in fifty-two hours. It is stated that General Burnside, after succeeding in clearing East Tennessee of the rebels, has sent his resignation to the War De-Fertment.


