LAWLESSNESS IN "LOUISIANA"

MURDERS OF AN ORGANIZED MOB.

From the New Albany, Indiana, Commercial. Upon and armed resistance, to and violation of law, constitute revolution, then there is a revolution in progress in Jackson county, for in that county law has been spurned and justice defied by an armed mob of two or three hundred men, whose acts of violence in the past nine or ten months have been of the most flagrant and murderous character. In no other part of the West has the law ever been so insultingly defied.

In December last, two men accused of crime were taken out of Brownstown jail by a mob and hanged. Recently a portion of this mob went to the residence of an old man near Rockford, who had fallen under their suspicion, took him from his bed, hanged him up and cut him down three different times in order to extort a confession from him, and left him in a state of stupor from which he never recovered, but died in half an hour after his barbarous torturers left his premises.

And still more recently six men, accused of robbery, have been taken from the officers of the law by force and hanged until they were dead. And later still, the news comes to us that another man, also accused of crime, was seized by this mob on Friday night and hanged upon a tree not far from Brownstown. Here are ten cold-blooded murders committed by this mob of Jackson county jayhawkers in less than nine months—murders in the first degree, within the full meaning of the law.

If the mob cannot be broken up any other way, let the Governor order a military force to Jackson county, with orders to put an estoppel upon the mob, if to do so it is necessary to employ powder, ball and bayonet. Jackson county is a disgrace to the State of Indiana, and it is indeed high time that the outrages enacted there be ended.

EXPERIMENTS WITH THE STEEL BOILER.

From the Pittsburg Chronicle, Aug. 26.

Yesterday afternoon another interesting experiment was made with the boiler manufactured at the Fort Pitt works, from homogeneous steel, made by Park, Brothers & Co., of this city. As before stated, the boiler is constructed of steel plates, one-fourth of an inch in thickness, is thirty-eight inches in diameter, and seven feet long.

As on the previous trial, it was tested by hydrostatic pressure, and on the tenth trial it withstood a pressure of seven hundred and twenty-five pounds to the square inch, when, in consequence of the giving away of one of the stay bolts, further experiments had to be abandoned for the present.

The boiler on yesterday afternoon stretched three-eighths of an inch during the several rests to which it had been subjected; in all it has stretched two and seven-eighths inches.

Some think that had sufficient force been brought to bear on the first trial the boiler would have withstood a pressure of twelve hundred pounds to the square inch. No boiler has ever before been known to withstand so high a pressure as the one tried on these occasions.

GRANT AS A GENERAL.—Greely, in his history of the war of the Rebellion, has the following in relation to one of Grant's battles:

"Twenty minutes after the first shot was fired fully 10,000 of our men were stretched and writhing on the sod or still and calm in death, while the enemy's loss was probably little more than 1,000. And when, hours later, orders were sent to each corps commander to renew the assault at once, without regard to any other, the men simply and unanimously refused to obey it. They knew that success was hopeless, and the attempt to gain it murderous, hence they refused to be sacrificed to no purpose."

That was not the only battle in which Grant exposed his army to useless butchery.
