THE PUBLIC DEBT-STRIKING ILLUSTRATIONS.

The Louisville Democrat has taken to illustrating the Public Debt, with a view of showing up its immensity. It says that the statements of the Public Debt published August 1, 1868, confesses that the amount of that great "national blessing" foots up \$2,528,584,480!

In that case it would take about 4,000,000 men, each standing three feet apart, would make a line about 3,000 miles long; and marching at the rate of three miles an hour it would require about forty days for this debt-burdened army to pass a given point!

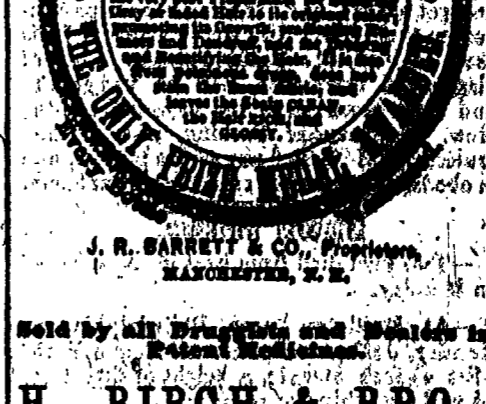
