RADICAL ECONOMY—the National Debt increasing at the rate of seventy-eight million dollars in three months, with the whole debt drawing six per cent interest in gold.

FOR AN SPECIMEN of Grant's "peace," see the article on first page, "Negro Outrages in North Carolina." It is only one of many similar outrages. We have had enough of such "peace."

DEMOCRATS, remember that "Pennsylvania is the battle-ground" this fall. It is of the utmost importance that every Democratic vote shall be polled at the October election.

The Indian Peace Commission of Gen. Sherman is another Radical humbug. The Indians have obtained all the arms and ammunition they want, and now they are ing for white settlers' scalps instead of game.

The National Debt increased fifty-three millions in June, thirteen millions in July, and twelve millions in August—a total of seventy-eight million dollars in three months.

The shipments of treasure from San Francisco from August 1st to August 20th, were \$2,006,474.71, making a total of \$25,327,864.88 since Jan. 1st. This is a decrease of \$2,178,108.05 from last year.

An unknown soldier shot two niggers in Louisville, Ky., Thursday night. One dark died. The soldier escaped. Grant's peace.

It is estimated that 5000 cattle will die of the Texas plague in the four counties of Inyo, Vermilion, Champaign and Ford, Illinois.

Contracts have been given out by the United States Quartermaster at St. Paul, Minn., for two million pounds of oats, at 60¢ cents per bushel.

The Illinois State geologist happened to stray into an Indiana city with his bag of stone-breaking tools, and was carried off to the station-house by the police as a burglar.

The Viceroy of Egypt has selected the plan of a palace to be built at Cairo, the estimate for which amounts to two and a half millions of dollars in gold.

Gen. Grant refused to exchange the Union soldiers in rebel prison-pens. This charge is fully borne out by all the evidence, even by that of Ben. Butler. Yet soldiers are now asked to vote for him because he was their commander during the war.

Under Democratic rule we had light taxes, provisions plenty and cheap, employment for all who sought it, and gold and silver money for all.

Under Radical rule we have heavy taxes, provisions scarce and dear, on account of thousands of fertile Southern acres lying desolate, no employment for workmen, and gold for the rich and paper for the poor.

A gang of men entered Versailles, Ky., a few evenings since, and made an attack upon the negroes, but were repulsed, with the loss of two of their number captured.

A servant girl, living near Louisville, was taken from her house, a few nights since, and tarred and feathered by several men.

Rev. Dr. Bellows, of New York, has written a letter to the London Times on the Irish church question. He says: "The establishment of the Irish Church is a measure of even more importance to the foreign relations than to the internal interests of Great Britain."

A woman attempts to murder her husband. BROOKLYN, Sept. 8.—On Friday, the wife of Capt. Edward Horton was lodged in the county jail at Riverhead, Long Island, for firing several shots from a revolver at her husband, in a fit of jealousy.

The California Election. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 8.—On account of a law which directs that the State election, when it occurs in the same year as a Presidential election, shall be held on the same day as said election, none was held to-day.

MURDER OF A SOLDIER IN CINCINNATI. CINCINNATI, Sept. 8.—A man named Thomas Lindley was shot through the head about 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon, by a stranger, and instantly killed.

FLOODS IN NEW JERSEY. ATLANTIC CITY, Sept. 8.—The recent heavy rains did immense damage to the lower part of New Jersey. It is reported that not a single mill-dam is left in Salem county. The railroads are considerably injured and the trains delayed.

AT 3 o'clock on Sunday morning a band of negroes went to the house of T. A. Alexander, on the Herndon road, near Memphis, Tenn., and called to him to get up.

A man named Willis, the same who killed the noted desperado, Sizemore, in East Tennessee, some twelve months since, shot and killed two negroes in Hawkins county, near Bristol, on Tuesday last.

Letters received by the Resident Democratic Committee at Washington from West Virginia and Illinois are of the most encouraging character.

William Meade Addison, Esq., of Baltimore, who brought suit against General Palmer for Messrs. Kimberly, makes a publication incorporating a note from Edward Kimberly, senior member of the firm, in which the latter says he authorized Mr. Addison to bring the suit in his name, and that under no circumstances shall it be abandoned until their claim is honestly and properly adjusted.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

By THE ATLANTIC CABLE. Riot in England. LONDON, Sept. 7.—Murphy, of Manchester, the noted public assaulter of Romanism, whose violent speeches have so often been attended with rioting, offered himself as one of the candidates to represent that city in the House of Commons, at the coming election.

On Saturday evening a meeting was called in the interest of Murphy, at which it was estimated that six thousand people were present. Speeches were made advocating his claims and denouncing the conduct of the magistrates toward him in the matter of the Ashton riots, in May last.

Horrible Murder of a Child in Philadelphia. PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 8.—At two o'clock this morning the party engaged in the search for Alice Morman, a child six years old, who disappeared from her mother's door-step at No. 2046 Orkney street, on Sunday evening, found her dead body. It was lying in a shallow pond near Sixth and Dauphin.

The Illinois Democracy. CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—General J. A. McClelland, Chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee, has issued an address, in which, referring to the fact that the 17th of this month is the anniversary of the "ordainment" of the Federal Constitution, he advises the Democracy of each city, town or other locality in the State, to meet and properly recognize the recurrence of the anniversary.

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TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY

WEDNESDAY, Sept. 9. The Louisiana House on Monday unseated a Democratic member as ineligible, giving his place to a Radical contestant, but subsequently reconsidered its action and provided for another election.

The Georgia Senate has passed a Home-stead bill, exempting \$3000 worth of property. Mr. Williams, one of the newly elected Circuit Judges in South Carolina, has declined the office.

The Massachusetts Republican Convention will meet to-day. It is thought Mr. Claflin will be nominated for Governor.

The Nevada Democratic Convention met on Monday, and nominated F. Anderson for Governor.

Hon. John Trimble has been commissioned as Judge of the Supreme Court in Tennessee. General Duncan has been relieved from command at Nashville.

A mass meeting of the Trade Unions of Albany, N. Y., was held last night, at which speeches were made and resolutions adopted sympathizing with the bricklayers' strike in New York.

Ex-President Pierce is dangerously ill at Concord, N. H. Prof. Charles A. Hitchcock, of New York, has been appointed State Geologist for New Hampshire.

The Grand Commandery of Knights Templars of New Jersey, met yesterday, and elected Dr. John Woolworth Grand Commander.

Bonded tobacco warehouses are to be established in New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Richmond, but the localities are not yet fixed.

A storm of enormous hailstones did considerable damage at Newton Falls, Mass., on Monday afternoon.

Professor Watson, of Detroit, announces the discovery of still another planet, appearing as a star of the tenth magnitude.

The Vermont State Fair began yesterday, at Burlington. A rebellion has broken out in the State of Tannapolis, Mexico.
