A disease is breaking out among the cattle at East St. Louis, and those afflicted with it have similar symptoms as were seen last summer. A large number have died within the last few days in the immediate neighborhood of the town.

The gold mines of North Carolina are now yielding about five hundred thousand dollars annually. Gold is found in twenty-five counties, besides other valuable metals.

In Philadelphia, on Saturday, a woman with a child in her arms, stepping from a car in Market street, above Tenth, had her dress caught by the car, which started and threw her on her back and dragged her about twenty or thirty feet. The woman showed great presence of mind by holding the child all the time at arms length above her unhurt.

The sales of tobacco in Louisville during the season, which closes this month, will reach 30,000 hogheads. In addition to this, the city has a number of manufacturers, which give employment to hundreds of hands, and turn out millions of dollars worth of work per year.

The Franklin Telephone Company, in connection with the Pacific and Atlantic lines, opened communication with Memphis, Tenn., on Friday last, and expect to open to New Orleans in a few days. The first move of this new company was to reduce the rate nearly one-third below that charged by the old lines. This is the only opposition line in the Southwest.
