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THE ELECTIONS

The result of the elections in the different States are reported as follows:

Maine is reported to have given 27,000 Republican majority.

New Hampshire—estimated Republican majority 6,000.

Vermont—estimated Republican majority 20,000 to 30,000.

Massachusetts—estimated Republican majority 70,000 to 75,000.

Rhode Island 6,000 Republican majority, and Jencks and Dixon, Republicans, re-elected to Congress.

Connecticut gives 8,498 Republican majority.

New York is supposed to have gone Democratic, and Hoffman is probably elected Governor.

Pennsylvania is supposed to have gone Republican by a small majority.

Ohio has gone Republican—majority claimed 35,000 to 40,000.

Illinois is claimed by the Republicans by 10,000 to 15,000.

Georgia is reported to have given a Democratic majority of 20,000 to 30,000.

South Carolina was also quiet. Grant has carried the State, but the Democrats claim two out of four Congressmen.

Delaware has been swept by the Democracy, who carried everything.

West Virginia is claimed by the Republicans, by 8,000—which is doubtful.

Louisiana was quiet, and is claimed by the Democrats by an overwhelming majority.

California is probably Republican, but the Democrats have carried San Francisco, and many of them claim the State.

Nebraska is reported at 4,500 for the Republicans.

Misouri is claimed by the Republicans.

Wisconsin gives about 15,000 Republican majority.
